Twenty-five years ago electricity as a mechanical power was unknown. Now \$900,000,000 is invested in various kinds of electrical machinery.

A Kansas man says that the value of farms went up, on an average, a thousand dollars apiece in his state last year, in consequence of the successful crops. This year, in consequence of the general dryness, the same farms have fallen away in value by about the same amount.

A new disease has been diagnosed in Boston. It is known as "the church-fan cold," and is caused by some lady behind the victim fanning herself. It is noticed, however, that people who stay away from church for fear of catching this form of cold can go to the theatre with impunity.

The Baltimore Sun says: "If the World's Columbian exposition has accomplished nothing else, it has made evident one thing which alone is worth all the cost and labor expended on the Fair. That thing is the inherent intellectual capacity of woman and her right to claim an equal place with man in every field of effort."

A test case of the constitutionality of the law giving to women the right to vote for School Commissioners will be tried in the Supreme Court in Syracuse this week. Two of the Democratic candidates for School Commissioner are women, who are making a strong canvass among women. The Republican County Committee is to make the test in the hope of having the names of all women who register stricken from the list.

The Grand Trunk accident at Battle Creek Friday morning, is the culminating horror, it is to be hoped, in a long series of slaughter on the rail which has marked the attempt to handle the World's Fair passenger traffic. In the Battle Creek wreck twenty-six people were killed and over twenty injured. The Erie road has been specially fortunate in handling its immense World's Fair traffic, doubtless because it uses the block system over the entire road.

More than once Americans have shown their antipathy to the establishment of a class of landed proprietors such as exists in England. In colonial days nearly the whole valley of the Hudson was in the hands of a few owners and the system was not broken up without forcible resistance on the part of tenants to the authority of the landlords. The policy of the government in the disposition of public land has always been to place it in the hands of many so as to prevent the landlord system from gaining a foothold on this side of the Atlantic. There are indications that custom in this regard is changing. The New York Homestead has been investigating the agricultural results of the last census and finds a marked decrease in the number of farms in New York and New England with a corresponding increase in the number of tenant farmers. From the figures it appears that New England has 8 per cent fewer farms than in 1880 and that New York has 6 per cent fewer. In other words, the farms in both New England and New York are larger and the land has fewer owners. The decline in the number of separate farms and the increase in the number of tenant farmers are not yet enough to cause alarm, but it is time, when the closest observers agree in the conclusion that agriculture in the United States has seen its greatest period of depression, it is more than advisable to keep the land in the hands of the people. Landlordism will never be allowed to flourish in America.

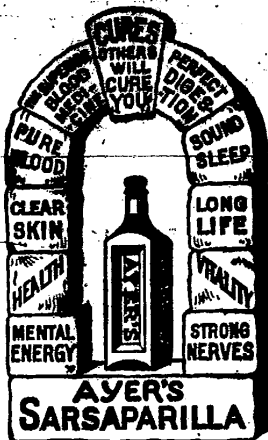
