The fourth district of the town o Bellmont, Franklin county, is per haps the only district in this state where there will be no election. The district is located in the south part of the town, and its only inhabitants are contractors and wood choppers of the Chateaugay Ore and Iron Co. There were 34 voters there last year. but this fall the number is put at about 15. Among them all there are only two men that can write, and these do it slowly and clumsily. They were elected inspectors last spring, and they now refuse to qualify. Secause of this refusal, and also be cause seven men able to read and write are necessary for the board, it is impossible to hold any election in the district.

Reports are in circulation to the effect that the supplies of petroleum in the United States are beginning to fail. For some time the Pennsylvania oil fields have fallen off in their production, and the older fields of Ohio are also said to be giving out, while new discoveries do not by any means balance the losses. In the old world the oil in Baku is largely taking the place of American oil, so that the exports from this side of the Atlantic may be expected to fall off If the reports prove true the effect may be that that the price of oil may advance here, but it can only be for a time, as there is little doubt that the oil fields of the Mackenzie river are the richest in the world, and if prices advance it will not be long before the prospectors will invade that section and have wells by the thousand.

Engineers are always, like the great Alexander, seeking new worlds to conquer. Mr. F. B. Behr, Associate of the Institution of Civil Engineers, finds steam locomotion on the surface of this plant too slow at a more or less dangerous maximum of sixty miles an hour, says the London Telegraph, and he proposes to whirl the man of the twentieth century at the rate of two miles per minute. Under the title of "Lightning Express Railway Service," he publishes a full statement of his plans, with all the necessary technical details.
