THE ELECTION.

**NEW YORK STATE, AND NEARLY
EVERYTHING ELSE, GOES REPUBLI-
CAN.**

**Allegany County Gives An Old-Time Repub-
lican Majority—Official Figures.**

The result of Tuesday's election was,
contrary to nearly everybody's expec-
tation, a complete Republican victory
in New York State, the entire State
ticket being elected by 30,000. Bartlett,
the Republican candidate for Judge of
the Court of Appeals, is elected over
Maynard by 90,000.

The State Legislature is also Repub-
lican in both branches. The two
houses will stand: Senate—Republicans
19, Democrats 13; Assembly—Republi-
cans 75, Democrats 53.

OTHER STATES.

In Ohio McKinley is elected Govern-
or by 90,000.

Pennsylvania goes Republican by
120,000.

Massachusetts goes Republican by
34,000.

New Jersey elects a Republican
Legislature.

Iowa goes Republican by 35,000.

An Entering Wedge.

Charles F. Wedge recently resided at
Raymond's Corners, Pa. He doesn't live
there now quite as much as he did.
On Wednesday night of last week he
took a horse from the pasture of Bay-
lies S. Bassett, at the head of the gorge
road between Lanphear Valley and Al-
fred Centre. He next entered the barn
of Melville Niles on the Warren Hill
road and took another. Mr. Niles and
Deputy Sheriff W. O. Place started in
quest of the missing equines. Mr.
Bassett's horse was lame and barefoot
and was easily tracked to Wellsville.
There the pursuers met James Place of
Alfred Centre who reported that he had
met Wedge a few rods this side of the
Pennsylvania line leading the horses.
Upon arriving at Wedge's home, about
11 o'clock p. m. Thursday, Mrs. Wedge,
who is more than twice her husband's
age and old enough to speak the truth,
claimed that he was not in the house,
but not being a very sharp wedge final-
ly owned up, and he accompanied a
Potter county constable to the State
line where Deputy Sheriff Place took
him to hand and conveyed him to the
Alfred Centre lockup.

Wedge is about 30 years of age. He
was taken from the Allegany County
House an infant by Mr. Albert Warren,
of Alfred Station, and was brought up
on the farm from which he stole Niles's
horse. He was once imprisoned for
theft while living there. He ran away
from Mr. Warren's about 13 years ago.
He was then known as Frank Warren.
