The Wild Monkeys of Europe.

The Wild Monkeys of Europe.

The monkeys of Gibraltar rock are said to enjoy the rare distinction of being the only monkeys in Europe not kept in cantivity. How did they come there? This question used to puzzle scientific men. It was once thought they were the descendants of some monkeys that had been brought over from Africa hundreds of years since, but now it is altered that they found a footing in Europe long, long before Spain as Spain was ever heard of. Before the sea wore away the land and made what is called the strait of Gibraltar, Europe and Africa were joined together, and animals roamed from one spot to another as they pleased.

When the time came, however, that the strip of land was at last swallowed up by the greedy occan, the strong current prevented creatures that were not at home in the water from crossing to and fro as they were wont to do. Among the unfortunates whose wanderings were thus mexpectedly cut short were many African monkeys, and the rock monkeys of the present day—whose numbers it may be added are growing less and less—are undoubted descendants of those prehistoric fellows. Of course it follows that the Barbary apes—the monkeys living on the African side of the strait—are the first cousins of the occupants of "Gib."

Bear and Buffalo.

When there were buffidoes on the plains, Manitola grizzly bears were keen and persistent hunters of them. When a grizzly and a buffalo met there was sure to be a fearful contest, although it seldom lasted long, and the buffalo was usually the victim. The buffalo bull, when confronted by a bear, would invariably churge ferociously upon its big and ugly foe. This was just what the bear desired, and he awaited, erect on his haunches, the onest of the buffalo. At the latter rushed forward, with lowered head, and was almost upon the bear the immense grizzly threw himself quickly to one side, and with a blow as quick as lightning with one of bis great forepaws seldom failed to break his antagonist's neck. A Manitoba grizzly has been known to engage, in rapid succession, four and even five infuriated buffalo bulls, and kill every one of them. It somatimes happened, though, that a bull younger and more agile than his com; anion succeeded in evading the fatal blow of the grizzly's terrible paw long enough to give in turn a deadly thrust of his hern into the bear's side, puncturing the vitals, and making the sontest a mutual slaughter. 
