Colorado joins Wyoming in giving complete franchise to women.

The tremendous victory won by McKinley in Ohio is construed by many astute politicians as foreshadowing the nomination for President in 1896 of the author of the present tariff law.

During the last fiscal year, 440,793 immigrants arrived in this country, which was 141,034 less than during the previous year. The decrease was chiefly from Russia and other cholera infected countries.

The Buffalo News calls upon Chauncey M. Depew to "lead" the Republican party in place of Thomas C. Platt. We hadn't supposed that Mr. Platt has been doing a great amount of "leading" lately—or bossing, either.

The Republican Senators elected on Tuesday of last week will have no vote in the election of a United States Senator. That is one comfort to the Democrats. The State Senate elected in 1895 will have a share in the election of a Federal Senator.

Chicago has no further use for Anarchists. Judge Gary who hanged the Haymarket murderers, was re-elected, while Kraft, running on the same ticket, but suspected of Anarchist sympathies, was "beaten." Gary ran far ahead and Kraft far behind his ticket.

A great sensation has been created by the official announcement that the administration's policy with regard to Hawaii contemplates not only a repudiation of the provisional government, but the restoration of Queen Liliuokalani to the throne. The report of Secretary Gresham concerning the matter, which was made public last Friday, warrants this view. It is not likely that such a course will be looked upon with favor by the majority of the American people. Another fact, severely commented upon by some of the leading papers, is that the report, which was dated Oct. 18, was withheld until after election.

Whatever amendments to the State Constitution are proposed by the convention which meets next May, will be framed on Republican principles. The party majority is 45 in a body of 175 members. The electors at large are Joseph H. Choate, Elihu Root, Edward Lauterbach, Jesse Johnson, Frederick W. Hollis, Michael H. Hirschberg, J. Rider Cady, John T. McDonough, John M. Francis, John F. Parkhurst, Comodore P. Vedder, John I. Gilbert, Augustus Frank, William P. Goodelle, Daniel H. McMillan. There are no amendments to the Constitution for which the people seem to be clamoring. Woman suffrage will probably be debated and considered. Biennial sessions of the Legislature which have been tried successfully in the second greatest state in the Union, will probably be considered. The sections of the Constitution relating to apportionment may be made so explicit that no future gerrymandering can be indulged in.

Despite the defeat of Samuel Gompers as a district delegate with a Republican endorsement, the labor party will get a respectful hearing to their propositions for changes in the organic laws.

VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The Hornellville sewer system is completed and in running order.

The glass factory has increased the population of Addison 200 persons.

Petitions to boards of supervisors for reimbursing drafted men are again circulating in many counties.

Ingham university, situated in Le Roy, N. Y., was sold last week on a mortgage foreclosure to William Lampson, a resident of that place.

Henry Frank, train-master of the Western Division of the Erie, died at his home in Hornellville last Friday. He was a very popular official.

Governor Flower has appointed Geo. F. Yeoman of Rochester, to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of Francis S. Macomber a Justice of the Supreme Court. Justice Yeoman is a Republican.

The Hornellville Herald says: "The city of Hornellville, before this time next year, will be using gas for fuel that will be manufactured at Canisteo and transported here in pipes, and at a price that will make the dealers in coal come down somewhat in the price now charged for that commodity."

At Canisteo, Wednesday, a team belonging to a farmer named Tucker, became frightened and ran away. A man who was standing on the walk with an ax, seeing the team coming, ran into the road, and struck one of them in the head with the sharp side of the ax—it stopped, and in a few minutes was dead.

The insurance agents of Olean have canceled all their policies at North Olean until protection against fire is provided. A system of water works will be built at once. E. Donahue has received the contract to build it, and has begun the digging of the trenches. The water works will be completed inside of a month.

A dispatch from Albany says: Articles of incorporation of the Canisteo Electric and Fuel Gas Company were filed with the secretary of state. Its object is to supply gas and electricity to the residents of Canisteo and Hornellville. Its capital stock is \$60,000 and its directors include W. G. Porter, Levi S. Davis and W. T. Bailey of Canisteo, and Geo. M. Webster of Greenwood.

The Republican Party's Birthplace.

Last Sunday's Buffalo Illustrated Express published a good picture of the Court House in Angelica, but by some unexplained mistake that paper locates the historic building in Allen, this county. The following item accompanies the picture and is interesting reading, although the reader should substitute Angelica for Allen:

"In publishing a picture of the old Court House at Allen, Allegany county, as the birthplace of the Republican party, we do not forget that that honor is claimed by two or three other spots and especially by the State of Maine. The late Hon. James G. Blaine on one occasion gave it as his opinion that Allegany county's claim was a good one. A few years ago the Express published an interview with the late A. N. Cole of Wellsville, an account of the meeting in this old Court House, which led up to the organization of the Republican party in Western New York."

Independence Man Seriously Injured.

An unknown man was found lying upon the Cass street walk between the railroad tracks at Hornellville Friday evening. An examination revealed no broken bones or apparently fatal injuries. The nose, forehead and left eye were bruised and cut severely. The man's hands are uninjured and this has given rise to the theory that he fell from a train and struck upon his face. The man who was picked up in an unconscious condition on the Cass street walk Friday evening has been identified. A friend of the injured man was in the city Saturday and read the account in the Times. Observing that the railroad ticket was from Wellsville to Scio, he began to think that perhaps he could identify the unknown man, and for that purpose went to see him and quickly pronounced the man to be Consider Hile of Independence, N. Y. The man's relatives were communicated with and his son George, of Willard, Potter county, Pa., arrived yesterday evening. In the morning a brother of the injured man arrived from Whitesville. These two are about the only near relatives the man has. He is a widower, his wife having been dead about 30 years.

The injured man was removed to the hospital Saturday afternoon. His condition has grown steadily worse, and at 10 o'clock Sunday night it was not expected that he would survive till morning. No new injuries have been discovered, and it is now supposed that his death will result from the bursting of a blood vessel near the brain. No new light has been shed concerning how he received his wounds.—Hornellville Times.

The injured man died at the hospital on Monday. It will probably never be known how he came to be hurt, as he never regained consciousness. By an autopsy held Monday it was found that death resulted from a clot of blood at the base of the brain, the clot being produced by a severe blow.
