Electric propulsion for canal boats
is a demonstrated fact, a satisfactory
test having been made on the Erie
canal near Rochester last Saturday.

Eight hundred and ninety-five women
voted in Steuben county. Of these 207
voted the Democratic ticket, 401 the
Republican, 270 the Prohibition and 17
the People's.

George A. Smith of Frankfort, has
been appointed by Agent Commissioner
Schraub as an instructor of farmers'
institutes for the ensuing year, in place
of George T. Powell of Ghent.

The basement of the Free Brethren's
church at Dayton was used for a poll-
ing place on election day, and for that
reason leading members refused to use
the church to worship in, and in conse-
quence divine services have since been
held in a private house.

The Standard Oil Company is put-
ting in a gas pump on the Smith farm,
southeast of Clarksville. It will be
used to pump gas into the big main
which supplies Olean and Wellsville.
The pumping plant complete will cost
over \$5,000, and will require two men
to run it.—Bohlar Breeze.

One of the barns on John Dinneen's
farm, near the village of Ellicottville,
burned to the ground Saturday night.
Six head of cattle were consumed, to-
gether with several vehicles and a lot
of farming tools. The loss is about
\$1,800, partially insured. The origin of
the fire is unknown.

be furnished gratis by benevolent citi-
zens.

Olean was dedicated last Thursday

the banquet. The toasts were many
and were responded to by prominent
men. It was a great night for the

Olean District Conference.

The Olean District of the M. E.
church held its semi-annual conference
at Olean, on Tuesday and Wednesday
of last week. The Olean District em-
braces the southern parts of Allegany
and Cattaraugus counties in New York
and the northern parts of Potter and
McKean counties in Pennsylvania. It
contains 44 pastoral charges, with 63
churches valued at \$340,000. It has
5,697 members of the church, and paid
last year for pastoral support, \$37,000.
It contributed for benevolent purposes
\$6,044.

Among the more important items
of business considered at last week's
conference was a plan for co-operative
evangelistic work by the pastors of the
district, through which much good is
expected.
