The Standard Oil Company has been driven out of Russia. That fact won't help those who are fighting the monopoly here, however.

That the hospitality of our country is greatly abused is shown by the figures in our last census. Almost 57 per cent. of the white persons in prisons and penitentiaries are foreign born.

The Board of Supervisors adjourned last Saturday morning to meet in Belmont December 11th. At the adjourned session the matter of building a new jail at Belmont will be considered and acted upon.

Bourke Cochrane, the celebrated Tammany orator, says that if the Democratic party carries out its policy of levying an income tax, New York city will be Republican for an indefinite period. It must be the rich men in New York are all Democrats.

Justice Hamilton Ward of the Supreme Court has granted an order restraining the canvassing board of Niagara county from canvassing the vote cast by women in the second school commissioner district. The board is directed to show cause why the vote should be counted. The order was issued at the instance of the defeated Republican candidate.

The names of candidates for the assembly speakership, already proposed are Hamilton Fish, George R. Malby, James O'Grady of Monroe, and J. H. Burts of Kings. Candidates for the senate clerkship are John S. Kenyon of Syracuse, Charles A. Ball of Wellsville and Palmer Wood of Herkimer. Hon. Herman Buck of Canisteo is a candidate for clerk of the assembly.

Since election a large number of new postmasters have been appointed in New York State, a number of them being as close by as Cattaraugus county. Allegany County Republican postmasters are expecting to be struck by lightning almost any day. Some people think, however, that very few changes will be made in this county until after the organization of the new County Committee in January.

Counterfeit railroad tickets to the amount of over \$100,000 have been honored in the last four weeks by the Baltimore & Ohio, Erie, Pittsburg & Western, Nickel Plate and other roads. There was absolutely nothing on the face of the tickets to indicate they were counterfeit. They were accepted without question by conductors, passed readily by the ticket counters and entered as of legal issue by the various ticket auditors. The tickets are the most perfect counterfeits of any kind issued.

The prevalence of crime in Chicago has become so alarming that martial law has been declared there, with the police force as garrison of the city. Every person found upon the streets between the hours of 1 and 5 o'clock a. m. will be halted by officers in plain clothes and requested to give an account of himself. He will be asked his name, residence and the cause of his being in the streets at so late an hour. If the answers given are unsatisfactory, the person accosted will be required to accompany the officer to a police station.

William Somers of Atlantic City, N. J., patentee of the "round about wheel," has secured a verdict against the Ferris Wheel Company of Chicago for an infringement of his patent. The case was tried in Circuit Court of Chicago and afterward carried to the United States Court in Philadelphia, where evidence was taken two weeks ago. Mr. Ferris on the witness stand testified that in 1892 he

was in Atlantic City and rode on the Somers wheel. He considered it a popular amusement, and afterward built from this suggestion the big Ferris wheel. The Court has not yet fixed the amount of damages on royalty. "Round about wheels," probably not unlike the one Mr. Somers claims to have invented, are not new to those who attended county fairs. Many years ago they were a regular attraction in this section.
