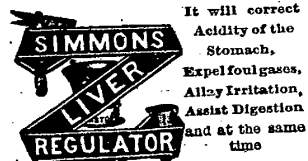

Last Week's Court.

County Court opened Monday with a jury in attendance. A half-dozen appeals were argued Monday, and some general business was transacted. On the criminal calendar, Watson L. Gray was sent to Buffalo penitentiary for 10 months, and Kinney was fined \$200 which was paid. They are two of the men who were with Ed. Bacon in the conspiracy against Steve Cartwright. Keating and Corcoran, the Cuba burglars, got off on the burglar charge but Keating got seven months at Buffalo for breaking jail. They got out of the burglary on the evidence of Mary Gallup, who swore she didn't recognize them as the burglars. She swore the other way before the grand jury. In her case, sentence was suspended, and Drs. Willard, Witter and Spencer were appointed to examine her as to her sanity.

Martin O'Reilly was sent to Buffalo for six months for jail breaking.

A Canadea man, Frank Westbrook, paid \$50 for selling hop soda.

A former Belvidere hotel man failed to respond when his name was called on an indictment for selling liquor in Friendship. John Pratt was on a bail bond for \$100, and will have to fork over that sum to the county.

Court adjourned Tuesday afternoon.

THE WATER WORKS TESTED.
Everything Appears to be Satisfactory So Far as the Working of the Line is Concerned.

It was expected that the Andover water works plant would be tested last Saturday, but Engineer Smalley could not be here on that day, and the test was postponed. He arrived Monday evening, and it was decided to test the line yesterday afternoon. This decision was reached so short a time before the time set for the test that it was impossible to notify outside parties who had expressed a desire to be here. However, we are sure an exhibition will be cheerfully given at any time, should any interested parties wish to inspect the working of the plant.

A test yesterday was made at each hydrant, and all were found to be in perfect working order. A 1½ inch nozzle was used, and the stream thrown was regarded as satisfactory. There is force enough to throw the water away over the highest building in town, and the volume of water discharged is sufficient to drown out almost any fire.

In short, Andover has adequate facilities for fighting fire. The protection is what we have long needed, and we believe every citizen should rejoice that it is at last secured.

The Mail Bags Wrecked.

Last Saturday evening train twelve ran over the mail bags which were thrown from the train at this station. The bags were thrown off west of the depot, and the supposition is that they struck the wires running from the telegraph tower to the semaphore at the depot, which run about eighteen inches from the ground, and bounded back under the car wheels. The bags were carried nearly to Main street crossing, and mail matter was found along the track as far east as the culvert east of the crossing. There were very few pieces that were unharmed, and a great portion of the contents of the bags was badly torn and damaged, some of it being totally destroyed. If the letter that you longed for did not come, here is perhaps the explanation. A glance behind the scenes in the postoffice after Saturday night's mail had been "distributed," led to the impression that someone had been having a "monkey and parrot time" in earnest. The tables were filled with bits of paper and other remnants of the disaster which had all been carefully scrutinized by Postmaster Green as he tried to render unto Caesar the things which were Caesar's.
