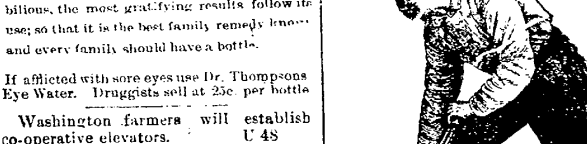

SAPOLIO

To Test Oil

In a recent lecture in Philadelphia Dr. Hagomah says that in these days, when so much petroleum oil is used for cooking and heating purposes, everybody ought to know how to test the oil, as many cheap, impure oils are on the market which are dangerous to handle. To be safe oil should have a float test of at least 130 degrees. The method of testing it is very simple. Take any small pan that can stand heat and fill it with fine sand. On this pour some of the oil to be tested and place in the mixture a thermometer. Now put it on the kitchen range so that the heat may gradually rise and watch the thermometer. Hold at the same time a very thin lighted taper over it. When the thermometer has risen sufficiently the vapor will ignite. The temperature is the flash point. By the way, servants ought to be warned against the practice of filling a lamp quite full. [Piscayne.]
