VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The Board of Supervisors of Cattaraugus county last week appropriated \$10,000 for a new County Clerk's office at Little Valley. Thus the county-seat question is settled for some years.

H. B. Williams, a barber of Bath was found dead in his room Friday morning with his throat cut and a bullet in his breast. He committed suicide, it is thought, on account of domestic difficulties.

At Niagara Falls, Friday, a verdict of \$14,500 was awarded George E. Baird against the Grand Trunk railway. Baird who was a section hand, was run down by an engine and had a leg cut off last May.

An exchange says: One man in Chicago finds profitable work in supplying ministers with sermons. He has 250 clients, who pay 50 cents to \$1 each. They are widely scattered over the country and among the denominations. His work is so remunerative that he employs several students as assistants.

Mrs. Curine of Salamanca, in attempting to board a cable car in Chicago a few weeks ago fell, breaking her right leg in three places. She told the grip man to stop the car as she was feeble, but this he did not do, and the result is that Attorney Thomas H. Dowd of Salamanca, has gone to Chicago to sue the street railway company.

The Corporation officers of Cuba have passed a bylaw empowering the street commissioner to cause the walks to be cleared of ice and snow, where property owners fail to attend to it. The cost of such work will be assessed against the property owners in front of whose premises it is performed, and the amount added to their corporation tax.

The boilers of two locomotives on the Lehigh railroad exploded last Friday. One of the explosions occurred at Van Etten, and the fireman and a man who was "dead heading" over the road were terribly scalded, their wounds resulting fatally. The other explosion occurred at Sayre, and the only person injured was the fireman, who will recover.

A new epidemic has made its appearance in Binghamton, and already a great many victims have been prostrated by the disease. It is a bronchial trouble and it takes a severe hold on the persons attacked. The features become drawn and pinched, and show a swollen appearance under the eye. The tongue and throat become covered with white patches, as in diphtheria, and there is a general wasting away of the tissues.

Herbert Vincent, the Elmira boy who shot Charles Jones, manager of the Postal telegraph office in that city, a number of months ago, was arraigned in court last week at Elmira. He was allowed to withdraw his former plea of not guilty to assault in the first degree, and to plead guilty of assault in the second degree. Sentence was suspended. Jones, the man he shot, lay at the point of death for a number of weeks, but finally recovered.

Train No. 287 on the Western New York & Pennsylvania, north, was wrecked three miles below Nunda between 5 and 6 o'clock Saturday morning. Two tanks of naphtha, seven oil cars, three cars of kindling wood, four lumber and one gasoline and the caboose were burned. The damage is between \$75,000 and \$100,000. Brakeman Lawson of Olean was seriously injured on the head and narrowly escaped being burned. Drs. Carrick of Nunda and Dodge of Morris were called. He may recover. The naphtha ran into a field where there was some water, which two of William C. Roberts' cows drank. They are alive but not much more. Wreckers from Olean and Rochester cleared the track.

Death of Wisner Doty.

Wisner Doty, who was recently taken to Willard Asylum, from Elm Valley, died this morning, aged 48 years. The funeral will be held Friday at 2 p. m. at the Baptist church in this village.

On Thursday last, death removed the oldest resident in Richburg, if not in Allegany county. On that day, Mrs. Wealthy Stillman Lanphere died at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. Ransom Cartwright, at the advanced age of 99 years, 2 months, and 2 days. Mrs. Lanphere's early days were passed in Rhode Island. In 1858 she moved to Alfred Centre, where she lived with relatives until she came to Richburg to live four years ago. Her husband died in 1897, and she never married again. Brief funeral services were held at the house on Sunday conducted by Rev. M. G. Stillman. The remains were conveyed to Alfred for interment.

A most deplorable accident occurred near Waverly Saturday, resulting in the instant death of a bright young boy. Soper, a few hours before, had drawn the ball from his rifle, but his father had reloaded it.
