VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

It cost \$59,188.06 to pave Hornellsville's Main street.

The Odd Fellows Association of Western New York has decided to locate its home in Lockport.

The Zoar oil and gas field, along the banks of the Cattaraugus creek, appears to be again coming into prominence.

Charles A. Ball, of Wellsville, expects to be appointed one of the assistant clerks of the state senate. The position pays \$20 a day for 100 days.

State Commander Cleary of the Grand Army of the Republic has decided on Jan. 21 and 22 for holding the annual state encampment at Rochester.

J. D. Hamilton one of the most prominent citizens of West Union, died at his residence Dec. 16. Mr. Hamilton had served on the board of supervisors. He leaves a wife and one child.

The Lehigh strike, which was never active enough to deserve the name of strike, cost the railroad brotherhoods \$105,000. That would have bought a good many Christmas presents.

Good news from the gas well this morning. At the depth of about 525 feet in well No. 3, a rushing vein of gas has been struck. This will be connected at once to the main pipe. The drill is down about 200 feet in well No. 4. —Canisteo Times.

The Hon. W. B. Hooker has had a thorough investigation made of all the wrecks which have occurred on the lake near Dunkirk during the last ten years, and will make strenuous efforts during this session of Congress to have a life saving station established at that place or in the immediate vicinity.

Allegany county Lodge, Good Templars, which met at Belvidere a few days since, elected the following officers for the ensuing year: C. T. A. R. White, Whitesville; secretary, W. H. Bassett, Alfred Centre; treasurer, C. W. Stevens, Alfred; superintendent, Mrs. G. R. Post Belvidere. G. E. Dew was elected county deputy.

A rumor is published to the effect that the New York Central is about to obtain control of the New York, Pennsylvania & Ohio and that even the entire Erie system between New York and Chicago may be included. The rumor is an interesting one at all events and fraught with much importance along the Erie system.

A dwelling house was burned one mile south of Troupsburg Centre Wednesday afternoon. A child about six months old was cremated. There was in the house at the time a half-witted old lady and she was also quite badly burned. The child belonged to Albert Herrington. The house was occupied by Samuel Tuttle. It is not known how the building caught fire.

It is rumored that Rev. Francis Dent, the Franciscan friar, who has been engaged in lawsuits with Bishop Ryan of Buffalo and other dignitaries of the Roman Catholic church, will appear no more in the civil courts. A Catholic priest friendly to father Dent, said that Father Dent's case had been submitted to Archbishop Satolli, and Father Dent had agreed to abide by his decision.

In Buffalo it is proposed to raise a fund of \$50,000 to be placed in the hands of a committee, to relieve the distress of the unemployed. The greatest effort will be made to furnish them with employment. The rate of wages to be paid will not exceed \$1 per day. Such a course will, it is thought, relieve existing suffering without making those relieved feel that they are receiving charity.

The Genesee Hose Co., of Wellsville has disbanded. The president of the village discovered that card playing was being carried on at the rooms of the company on Sundays, and he caused a lock to be put on the door, and the rooms locked up. The company deeming this an insult to them, demanded that the lock be immediately removed or they would disband. President Brown refused to remove the lock, so on their own statement the company no more exists.

Death of Jason M. P. Beebe.

We have never made an announcement to the readers of the News with a greater degree of regret than we now feel upon being called upon to announce the death of Mr. Jason M. P. Beebe, which occurred at his home in this village Friday evening, December 22, 1893. The Saturday previous to his death Mr. Beebe was taken ill with what was pronounced grip. The disease soon affected his stomach and bowels, and after being ill two or three days he grew rapidly worse, and the most devoted attention failed to stay the progress of the disease. He had been troubled for a long time with an affection of the stomach, and there is little doubt that the weakness of that organ rendered relief more difficult than would have been the case under different circumstances. The cause of death was given as peritonitis.

Mr. Beebe held the respect and esteem of the people of this place to a remarkable degree, and the confidence reposed in him was not misplaced. His honor and integrity, his courteousness and general good standing in this community were recognized and commented upon long before the time came when his good qualities were brought more forcibly to mind as having been possessed by one who comes and goes no longer in our midst, and the memory of Jason Beebe will live in the hearts of his friends and associates until the shadows gather about those who knew and loved him so well here.

The deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. N. L. Beebe of this place, and was born in this town twenty-two years ago the 11th of last June. He was married Sept. 28, 1892, to Helen Brainard, daughter of Dr. N. P. Brainard of this place. Universal sympathy is extended to those upon whom the affliction falls most heavily.

Mr. Beebe was the junior member of the firm of Beebe, Williams & Co. of this place. He was also manager of the Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies' offices here, and his business transactions were conducted in such a manner as to be most pleasing to those with whom he came in contact.

The funeral services were held Monday forenoon at the M. E. church and were conducted by Rev. J. M. Leach and Rev. Joshua Clarke. The large edifice was packed to the doors by sympathizing and bereaved friends, neighbors and relatives. Members of Mutual Tent K. O. T. M. and the C. W. O'Donnell hose company attended in a body, the deceased being a member of both these organizations.

So many have been the expressions of sympathy in our affliction, and so many services have been rendered by our friends, that words are powerless to express our gratitude. May the dear Lord, who has upheld and comforted us, be with you all.

Belmont has two fire engines, but both were out of repair, leaving only buckets and pails with which to fight fire.
