Chinese registration under the Geary law began last Wednesday. Information received at the internal revenue bureau from the west states that all indications point to a complete registration of Chinese on the Pacific slope.

There have been in the city of New York during the last ten months more evictions of tenants than have taken place in Ireland during the last ten years. What's the matter with them as a study for American philanthropists?

There will be plenty of novelties at California's Midwinter Fair. One of considerable interest will be a veritable lake of quicksilver. Cannon balls, sledge hammers, rocks and other heavy articles will be placed beside the lake, and visitors will be privileged to sail these strange craft in the silver sea. Another exhibit is to be a house built of pine boards 150 feet long. The house will be of that length, and not a cross crack will be seen in its sides. The Ferris Wheel and Eiffel Tower are to be outdone by a figure of Justice 150 feet high, holding in her hands scales with a cross beam 300 feet long. In each scale fifty people may be seated and raised, by dipping the scales, to a height of 288 feet.

A balloon 65 feet in diameter was recently cut loose at St. Louis, bearing in its basket scientific apparatus prepared by United States Weather Forecaster W. H. Hammon, including an automatic registering thermometer and an aneroid barometer for the purpose of determining the distance travelled, the altitude reached, and the conditions of temperature by means of self-registered observations made upon a roll of paper. A photographic camera, operated by clockwork, will take a picture of the earth if the weather permits, while other clockwork so operates sand bal- lasts as to insure the balloon's remaining in the air some days. A wire cage will protect the instruments from injury when the balloon falls. A card gives the finder proper directions.

The Supervisors at their recent session passed a resolution directing the Superintendent of the Poor to file an itemized account with the clerk of the Board so that reference could be made to it at any time, the same as the accounts of other officials. The Superintendent has never filed his account before, but has kept it in the office at the County House. A resolution was introduced to abolish the keepership at the County House, but was tabled. However, a resolution that the chair appoint a committee to investigate affairs at the County House, with a view of obtaining information regarding the practicability of abolishing the keepership and enforcing greater economy in other departments of the poor business was passed, and the committee, consisting of Messrs. Hunt, of Belfast; Bunnell, of Ward, and Perkins, of Genesee, was appointed, to report next November.

## After Many Years.

A story that is stranger than fiction has just come to light in the village of Penn Yan. In 1863 Henry Williams lived with his young wife and infant daughter on Head Street. The future was bright and the family was happy. One day the shop where Williams was employed closed down, and after many weeks of struggling, Williams decided to go to New York to look for work.

While on the street there seeking employment his attention was attracted by a mob of men and boys who were fighting. He stopped to look on. A misdirected stone struck Williams in the head and knocked him insensible. He was picked up and taken to the hospital, where it was found that his skull was fractured. He lingered between life and death for many weeks

and at last when he began to recover his mind was gone and he was removed to the insane hospital at Blackwell's Island. The shock also produced paralysis in the lower limbs. There was nothing on Williams to identify him and the poor fellow could not tell his own name, so he was entered on the books of an "Unknown."

Williams's daughter grew to womanhood and was married and his wife mourned her husband as dead. A few weeks ago Postmaster Andrews of Penn Yan received a letter from Mrs. Vanderwater, who is connected with various charitable institutions in New York, asking for the whereabouts of Williams's family. Mrs. Vanderwater told the postmaster that she had become interested in the poor fellow in the hospital on Blackwell Island, who was recovering his reason. He had told Mrs. Vanderwater who he was and from whence he came. It was Henry Williams, and Mrs. Vanderwater explained in her letter to Postmaster Andrews, he had asked her to make inquiries concerning his family.

The correspondence resulted in a reunion of a long separated family, Williams coming home Friday after an absence of 30 years. Mrs. Williams, though she thought her husband dead, remained true to his memory and is living with her daughter Mrs. John Harford.

There was Christmas joy all over the land last Monday, but it is safe to say there was no happier home than that of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Williams after so many years of separation in such tragic circumstances.
