VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

Messrs. Oliver Lewis and Charles E. Wells of Hume have bought the E. B. Tuller hardware stock in Wellsville and open up for business at once.

A. A. Hamilton, the newly appointed postmaster at Alfred Centre, who became blind after having several teeth extracted, is regaining his sight.

The Standard Oil company is leasing all the land in the vicinity of Fredonia and it is rumored will commence operations in the spring, boring for gas and oil.

Arrangements are being made for the State Convention of the Young Men's Christian Association which will be held in Jamestown on February 22 to 25.

The Chicago drummer evangelist, T. H. Osborn, is holding union meetings at Cuba. Nearly 200 people have been converted and more are expected to follow.

Mr. J. A. Hubbard, of Plainfield, N. J., has been elected president of the Celadon Terra Cotta Company at Alfred Centre in the place of George H. Babcock, deceased.

The next fair at Angelica will be the fiftieth annual fair held by the Allegany County Agricultural Society since it was organized. It is proposed to make the semi-centennial fair worthy the occasion.

The average ratio of taxation in all the towns in Allegany county is 10.4679 mills. The tax in Wellsville is the lowest, being 4.9455, and Angelica is the highest, having a ratio of 18.6818 mills on each dollar of its equalized value.

The Cuba Patriot recently celebrated its 33d birthday. If it lives to be one hundred we don't believe it will be a better paper than it is now. By the way, J. F. Coad, who is connected with the paper, is to be married tomorrow to Miss Parks of Cuba. In the language of Joe Jefferson and several other less famous actors, "May they live long and prosper."

One day last week Mrs. Susan Burr, who lived opposite the depot at Belvidere, crossed over the Erie track to the depot after remaining there a few minutes she started home. She had just got on the track when a shrill whistle of the engine of a coming train was heard. The old lady was too deaf to hear the signal, and in an instant was struck and killed. Deceased was over 83 years of age, and an old and respected resident.

An exchange says that Postal notes which have been in use several years for sending small sums of money by mail, will be done away with July 1st next. They have never been very satisfactory or popular. To take their place the rates on small money orders will be reduced. Under \$2.50 the rates will be three cents, the same as a postal note. The rates increase above that point very gradually until they reach thirty cents for sums between \$75 and \$100.

Cannot Vote For School Commissioner.

An important decision has just been given by the court of appeals affirming the decision of Justice Williams of the Supreme Court, fourth department, which was upheld by the general term in declaring unconstitutional the law allowing women to vote for school commissioner. The opinion is by Judge Finch and all the judges concur.

The opinion states that counsel conceded that the question hinged upon the interpretation of the constitution regarding what constituted constitutional officers, it being admitted that none but male citizens had a right to vote for such.

Judge Finch says that there are two definite and distinct classes of school officers—those of the school district, the unit of the system, and those of superintendents over a larger or smaller number of such unities aggregated; and that the latter are and always have been as clearly either town or county officers as the former have not been. The judge says:
"I am able to see, therefore, that any practical construction prior to the act of 1892 has ever been given to the constitution which takes the elective officers charged with superintendency out of the category of constitutional officers or puts a constituency behind them having other qualifications than those necessary for the election of town and county officers."
