In times of peace it is easy enough for any man to act as President of these United States. I refer you to the husband of Mrs. Hayes, but it took a Lincoln, gentle, great, sad, to pilot a nation through the majestic times and awful horrors of civil war." Justice Brewer declared that this is a Christian nation, not by force of arms or Constitution, but through

"the hopes and purposes and faith of the people who have wrought its glorious history from Plymouth Rock to the Sandwich Islands."
