VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

A new National Bank is talked of in Wellsville.

The Catholics will erect a \$40,000 church at Jamestown.

Friendship is again talking incorporation. The list of incorporated villages is growing at an enormous rate.

Coroner T. S. Thomas of Black Creek will soon become a resident of Cuba, having bought an interest in the Allen drug-store at that place.

The Maccabees of Friendship, one of the most prosperous tents in this State, are contemplating building a temple. It will contain a public hall, offices and stores for rent.

Franklinville is the model temperance town in this section. At its recent town meeting it gave 304 votes against license to only one for. It is doubtful if Alfred Centre could do better than that.

A young man residing in Penn Yan advertised for a wife and his sister answered the advertisement. The Penn Yan Chronicle says that the young man's father and mother are mourning over the fact that there are two fools in one family.

John J. Merrill, editor of the Alfred Sun, has received from Comptroller Roberts an appointment as assistant clerk in the Comptroller's department at a salary of \$1,500 a year. It beats all what nice places editors occasionally drop into.

School Commissioner Stephen Pollard will hold teachers' examinations in the southern commissioner's district as follows: Alfred Centre, March 1st and 2nd; Cuba, April 6th and 7th; Belmont June 7th and 8th; Wellsville, August 16th and 17th; Bolivar, September 7th and 8th; Andover, October 5th and 6th.

The next meeting of the Allegany county Editor's Association will be held at Canaseraga the first Friday in April. Invitation has been extended to Wyoming and Livingston county editors to meet with the Allegany Association at that time. Editor Miller and wife of the Times will entertain the Association.

At Hornby, Steuben county, last week Tuesday, Henry W. Stevens a well known and respected resident of that town, went to the polls to vote at town meeting. After securing his ballot he went into the booth, a minute later he fell backward to the floor, and died in less than five minutes. Heart disease is supposed to have been the cause of his death.

Senator McMahon has introduced a bill appointing William W. Averell, William Rumsey, Frank Campbell, Ira Davenport, Stephen Haight, Charles W. Gillette, Milo M. Acker, John F. Parkhurst and George J. Magee, a commission to erect a statue of Fredrick William Baron Steuben, at Bath, Steuben county. The sum of \$25,000 is appropriated.

A boy near Rushford fell into a well 50 feet deep and broke a leg. His mother and sister undertook to pull him out and got him up to the top of the well, but just as they thought him safe the rope broke, and he fell again, breaking an arm. They drew him out again with the same result, breaking two ribs and rendering him unconscious. A neighbor came along and went down in the well and got him out.

Want A Receiver Appointed.

It was rumored in this village a few days ago that a movement was on foot in Wellsville to have a receiver appointed by the courts to take charge of Baldwin Brothers' affairs, in place of the assignee designated by those gentlemen. It is understood the movement was started by some who did not favor the plan of making the matter so much of a family affair, Mr. Rathbone, the assignee, being a brother-in-law of the Baldwins. It is also thought by some that the McEwen faction of the Republican party in Wellsville was at the bottom of the scheme.

Last Week's Court Record.

Charles F. Wedge—the "entering wedge" who last fall entered Mellville Niles' barn in Alfred and took a horse, and also entered B. S. Bassett's pasture and took another, will soon enter Auburn prison, for a stay of three years. He pleaded guilty to grand larceny last week at Belmont, and received the above sentence. Other criminals were disposed of as follows: Wilson Barrett, a tramp who threw a flat-iron at the head of Mrs. Dana Matthews of Friendsip, pleaded guilty to assault in the first degree and was sentenced to Auburn for ten years. James Hughes pleaded guilty to burglary, third degree, and will board at Auburn the next 4½ years. James H. Dooley, for violation of the license laws at Belvidere, was fined \$100 or 100 days in jail. William Bradt of Allentown pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 for violation of the excise laws. William McDonald of Cuba, same offense, pleaded guilty and was fined \$75. Edgar Bradley of Cuba pleaded guilty to the same offense and will pay the county \$50. Mary Gallop of Cuba assisted burglars to enter her foster-father's house. She pleaded guilty and was sent to the Erie county penitentiary for one year and seven months. William Newman enticed a 13-year-old girl to run away with him. He pleaded guilty to kidnapping and was sentenced to the Erie county penitentiary for 10 months.
