## VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

Revival meetings are being held in Belmont.

Wellsville's Congregational church has women ushers.

A gold cure for women has been established at Little Falls, New York.

The rates of insurance have been increased in Hornellsville from 15 to 100 per cent.

The next meeting of the Allegany County Farmers' Club will be held at Belmont.

A. T. Willson has been appointed postmaster at Angelica. He has been a clothing merchant in that place for many years.

A county convention for the woman suffrage movement is to be held at Wellsville on April 3rd and 4th. Several prominent speakers are to be present.

It is said that the terra cotta works at Alfred Centre, which have been closed for the last two months, will shortly resume operations. The works employ about 60 men.

Last week a horse fell dead on the streets of Jamestown. Its owner sold it to a butcher who made it up into bo'ogna sausage. All parties to the transaction are to be hauled over the coals.

Friendship taxpayers will vote on the question of incorporation some time next month. The proposition was defeated a number of years ago, but it is believed that it will go through this time.

There are 202 women taxpayers in the town of Salamanca, and the assessed valuation of the property for which they are taxed aggregates \$150,000. The women are demanding the ballot, and why not.

Mr. Hiram Huntley, one of Angelica's old and most respected citizens, died last week. Mr. Huntley was 76 years old and has lived in this county over 60 years. He had been an insurance agent at Angelica for many years.

It has been decided to hold the annual Sunday School Association of the town of Independence at Whitesville on Wednesday, March 14th. Rev. Dr. E. A. Leeper and Rev. F. H. Cowman of Wellsville will be present to address the Association. An interesting meeting is expected.

A bill has been introduced in the Legislature appropriating \$125,000 for another reformatory at Ellenville, Ulster county. The Elmira reformatory is already overcrowded and additional accommodations are necessary. This appropriation would make provision for 500 people.

A bill regulating the width of vehicle tires has been introduced in the senate by Senator Mullin. It forbids the use of tires less than 3 inches wide on vehicles weighing 500 pounds, and less than 4 inches wide on those weighing more than that; and provides for partial payment by the state to persons who widen their tires.

On account of what the Erie officials deemed a high assessment of their property in the town of Portage, they caused an examination to be made of the assessments in that town, and found a total of about \$100,000 worth of unassessed personal property there. The matter has been quite a shake up for that town, and a similar investigation is to be made in other towns.

Cornell sophomores again demonstrated Tuesday night that beastliness and fiendishness are the principal characteristics of the collegian. They put assafoetida in the food at the freshmen's banquet, let chlorine gas in the hall, rendered several men sick or insensible, killed a negro cook and in many other ways richly deserved a lynching, which was threatened them.

Sullivan county has another murder to darken the pages of its history. A double murder, the most brutal crime that ever took place in this county, was committed last Thursday night. Both of the victims are over 80 years old. Jacob A. Moore and his housekeeper, Mrs. Jane Raymond, aged 80, were murdered at their home, three miles north of Monticello, by first being shot with a .22 caliber revolver and then being cut and horribly mutilated with

a barn shovel. It is supposed that the motive for the terrible crime was money, although they were poor and their only income was a monthly pension of \$12. A few days before Mr. Moore was murdered he received three months back pension.

Assemblyman Fish has introduced in the Legislature the bill of last year to establish a colony for epileptics in Livingston county. The bill passed in both houses last year, but Gov. Flower allowed it to die with other 30 day bills, basing his action on the ground that enough money already had been spent on public institutions for one year. The State Board of Charities still favors the bill, however, and will urge its passage. It is proposed to call the institution the Craig colony, in memory of the late Oscar Craig, president of the State Board of Charities, who died last month. The care of dependent epileptics long had been a subject to which he was devoted. The colony will be located on the property lately used by the United Society of Christian Believers, which includes 1800 acres in Livingston county. The object of the institution is to assure the humane, curative, scientific and economical treatment of epileptics, exclusive of insane epileptics.
