Eugenie Prager Liberated. BERLIN, Feb. 26.—The notorious Eugenie Prager, sentenced two years ago to six years imprisonment for having tried to kill her husband, has been pardoned by the emperor and liberated.

Ball Practice Killed Reed. MIDDLETOWN, Conn., Feb. 26.—An autopsy on the body of young Reed, the Wesleyan baseball player who died suddenly Saturday, after practicing in the cage, showed a rupture of a blood vessel in the brain, doubtless caused by jerking his head in pitching the ball.

STEELE MACKAYE DEAD

Passed Away Suddenly on Board a Train.

He Was Enroute to San Diego, Cal., for His Health at the Time—His Luck Followed Him from the Time He Left Chicago—Brief Sketch of an Interesting Life.

LA JUNTA, Col., Feb. 26.—Steele Mackaye, author and dramatist, died yesterday near Pimlico, on board a Santa Fe railroad train while enroute to San Diego, Cal., where it was hoped that he would be able to build up his health.

Mr. Mackaye, accompanied by his wife, Dr. Parker and a nurse, left Chicago Thursday in the private car of George R. Peck, of the Santa Fe road.

His luck followed Mr. Mackaye from the beginning of his last journey. In the first place his baggage, containing medicines, etc., was forgotten and when a few miles out some fender threw an iron bar six inches long through the stateroom window.

Steele Mackaye's Career. Although it has been claimed that he was an Englishman, the dead dramatist and promoter was born at Fort Porter, on the banks of the Niagara river, now a portion of the city of Buffalo, about 41 years ago.

At the age of 18, while convalescing from an attack of brain fever in France, he occupied himself with painting and modeling, the artistic instinct inherited from his mother having by this time strongly asserted itself.

After appearing with marked success in a number of Shakespeare's plays, notably in the title role of Hamlet, he began to write the knowledge of his art to the writing of plays. In collaboration with Tom Saylor, he produced two plays in London with success—"Arkwright's Wife" and "Clancarty."
