### Suffrage Convention at Wellsville.

A County Constitutional Convention will be held at Wellsville on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 3 and 4. The object of this Convention is to discuss the advisability of amending the State Constitution so as to enfranchise women citizens. This is one of a series of sixty Conventions being held in this State, one in each county.

Among the speakers at Wellsville will be Rev. Anna Shaw, Susan B. Anthony and Mary G. Hay. Local speakers are also expected, among whom are Judge Norton, District Attorney Brown, A. L. Litchard, Mrs. V. A. Willard, Miss Mary Bowler and others.

It is desired that large delegations should be present from every town in the county. The question of Woman Suffrage is being agitated as never before, and no one who is interested in the subject should remain away from this Convention.

We wish to impress upon the people of this section that in all probability the success of the woman suffrage movement rests largely with the women themselves. We believe that a determined effort by the women will now have a good effect. Let it be shown that a majority of the women of this state desire to be enfranchised, and that they are not merely willing to vote, but insist upon that right being given them, and the battle will be well-nigh won. In our opinion the request of a few will have little effect, but the request of many cannot be ignored, and if the women of this county actually desire to be enfranchised, now is the time to show their hands and let their voices be heard. The men, also, who favor this movement, should not now be silent.

Let Andover and the surrounding country send a delegation to Wellsville that will be representative of the sentiment here prevailing.

The first session of the Convention will be held Tuesday afternoon, April 3, at 2:30 o'clock. Among the subjects to be discussed at this session will be the following: "Why Patrons of Husbandry Believe in Equal Suffrage." "Why Moral Reformers Believe in Equal Suffrage." "Why Tax-Paying Women Believe in Equal Suffrage." "Why Business Women Believe in Equal Suffrage."

Rev. Anna Shaw will speak Tuesday evening, and Susan B. Anthony Wednesday evening.
