There may be a business spurt at any time. All the manufacturing interests of the East believe it will come as soon as the tariff vote is reached. The people have faith in the coming of a better time, and their close economies are helping to bring it.

Governor Flower has signed a bill appropriating \$125,000 to establish the eastern New York reformatory, at Wawarsing, Ulster county. Forty thousand dollars of this appropriation is available immediately, and the remainder after April 1, 1895. The institution is intended to relieve the crowded condition of the Elmira reformatory.

Gen. Roy Stone, of the road improvement division of the agricultural department at Washington, gives some interesting facts concerning the cost of country road improvement. He gives assurance that Gov. Flower would sign the Kerr bill if the legislature sends it to him. Gen. Stone estimates that it would cost on an average \$1,500 a mile in this state to stone roads eight feet wide with an earth track on one or both sides. He estimates, after giving figures to support his statement, that the only expense to farmers would be the increase of one-half of their present road tax (which averages ten per cent an acre), for ten years, and that only for neighborhoods which chose to have their roads improved. The state and county tax appears to be insignificant when the benefit is considered. This seems to accord with the statement of the New Jersey farmers, who unanimously testify that the increase in taxation, because of their good roads, is unimportant, while the benefits are manifold.

Steuben Presbytery.

The spring meeting of the Steuben Presbytery was held at Cuba, N. Y., April 17th and 18th. The opening sermon was preached by the retiring moderator, the Rev. S. W. Pratt, of Campbell. The Rev. James R. Robinson, of Painted Post, was chosen moderator; Rev. M. N. Preston, stated clerk; Rev. J. A. Miller, Ph. D., permanent clerk, and Rev. Geo. F. Danforth, temporary clerk. James Wilkes and Robert Clements, of Auburn Theological Seminary, were licensed to preach the Gospel after being examined. Mr. Bisby, also of Auburn seminary, having been already licensed, was ordained an evangelist. Mr. Clements and Mr. Wilkes were also ordained, and Mr. Clements was installed pastor of the church at Cuba.

A call to become pastor of Harts-horn Presbyterian church was placed in the hands of the Rev. Geo. Danforth, who took the call under consideration, his decision to be made at a later date. The commissioners appointed to attend the General Assembly, which is to meet at Saratoga, May 17th, are: Minister, Rev. Duncan Cameron, the Rev. Alfred T. Vail, assistant; Elder, Mr. Hutchinson, of Jasper; and Mr. Hodgman of Painted Post. The Rev. Wm. Veenschoten was granted a letter to Lehig Presbytery, he having received a call to East Stroudsburg Presbyterian church.
