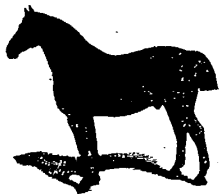

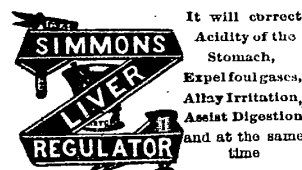

Republican County Committee.

The Republican County Committee met for organization at Cuba last Saturday. Clarence Richer of New Hudson was elected permanent chairman of the committee, and M. E. Horner of Belmont was elected Secretary and Treasurer.

The following resolutions were adopted.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee recommend to the several town committees a date for holding all caucuses in the county.

Resolved, That this committee recommend that all caucuses be organized under the Statute and that all delegates be elected by ballot.

The County Executive Committee was elected as follows: The Chairman and Secretary ex-officio; Jas. K. Hodnett, Hume; J. S. Rockwell, Angelica; Joseph F. Rice, Friendship; F. A. McGinty, Andover; Archie Gillies, Birdsell; W. D. Ormiston, Cuba; Chas. A. Ball, Wellsville.

Ex-Prisoners of War Meet.

A meeting of the ex-prisoners of war of this county was held at Friendship last Saturday. The meeting was called to discuss the matter of obtaining compensation for those soldiers who were detained in rebel prisons beyond the term of their enlistment. After some discussion the following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, The responsibility of the General Government for the detention of Union soldiers in southern prisons, during the late civil war, beyond the period of their enlistment, is clear and capable of specific proof and the amount of compensation due from the general government on this account is susceptible of investigation by the Court of Claims, therefore

Resolved—That we hereby ask our Congressman Hon. W. B. Hooker, Senators Hill and Murphy to introduce and pass a bill enabling us to bring our cause before the Court of Claims.

Resolved—That we ask our comrade ex-prisoners and G. A. R. men throughout the State to memorialize their representatives in Congress in behalf of the above law and to do it quick, as our ranks are rapidly thinning, under the privations we endured in the field and in prison.

The Indian Reservation Lands.

Representative W. B. Hooker is confident that it will be an easy matter to quiet the title of the Ogden Land Company to the Allegany-Cattaraugus Indian reservations and that it will not be long until those fine farming lands can be opened to settlements. In discussing the matter a few days ago, he said: "I understand that Congress can buy off the claim of the land company for \$200,000, and I am in favor of selling it in that way and then throwing open those broad and fertile acres to the farmers."

"The Indians speak English, have a president and a legislative council and a judicial body known as the Peacemakers' Court. They are well educated, but are not overstrict in their dealings. They have a curious divorce law, too, by which an Indian can leave his family, get a divorce from the Peacemakers' Court without previous notice to his wife and then marry another woman. This is a grade of civilization which is a few steps in advance of Chicago and South Dakota."

Death of Mrs. H. E. Miner.

Martha Jane, wife of Mr. H. E. Miner, of this place, died at Buffalo, Sunday morning, April 29th, 1894.

Mrs. Miner went to Buffalo nearly three months ago to receive medical treatment. She had been in poor health a number of years, and while there seemed good chances for recovery after the case had been examined by Buffalo physicians, complications arose and the patient gradually grew weaker, although at times slight improvement was seen. For the past few weeks she had been very low, and was taken worse a day or two previous to her death, gradually sinking until her death.

The deceased was born in Ithaca, N. Y., Nov. 3, 1848. When she was less than a year old, her parents moved to Andover, and she lived here nearly all her life. She was well known here as a woman of many virtues, highly respected by all and dearly beloved by her friends and relatives. As was remarked by her pastor in the funeral sermon: "Her kind spirit and doings are a better and more fitting eulogy than words of mine." She was baptized at the age of 16, and had been a member of the Andover Baptist church for thirty years.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church yesterday afternoon, Rev. W. Brewster officiating, assisted by Revs. G. M. Javes and J. M. Leach, of this place, and Rev. J. Kenyon, of Independence. The floral tributes were elaborate and exceedingly beautiful. They were furnished in part by the W. C. T. U. and the Bible class of the Baptist church, Mrs. Miner being a member of each. The pastor gave well merited tribute to the memory of the deceased in words fittingly chosen and impressively spoken.

Unmeasured sympathy is manifested by the people of this place for the sorrowing husband and son, and also for the brothers, sisters, relatives and friends of the deceased.

G. A. R. Association.

The Allegany County G. A. R. Association met in Andover last Thursday. About one hundred and twenty-five delegates and representatives were present from out of town, nearly every G. A. R. Post in the county being represented. The business places—and many dwellings in this place were gaily decorated with flags and bunting, in honor of the occasion, and the members of Seaman Post and the Women's Relief Corps were out in full force to welcome and entertain the visitors. The martial band was also on hand and made inspiring music.

The business meeting was held at G. A. R. Hall, President Marsh in the chair and Rev. Wayne Brewster officiating as chaplain. Routine business was transacted and a committee was named to select a place for the next annual camp-fire.

At Prest's opera house the W. R. C. took care of the boys, who sat down to a bountiful board. The visiting veterans are loud in praise of the feast given them by the patriotic women of Andover. Following the dinner were brief speeches by Hon. A. B. Cottrell, A. L. Litchard and Rev. A. E. Witter. The Euterpe Club was present and contributed largely to the pleasure of the occasion. Our townspeople always appreciate their work, and our visitors vied with our citizens in rendering due applause to merit. Miss Minnie Clair and Miles Herrick sang a duet, "That Missing Voice," in a manner that captivated the audience. H. W. Green, of Alfred, presented a good poem, G. B. Herrick and A. P. Wood faithfully represented the old soldiers in song. Mrs. E. Smith and Miss Inez Lever sang a duet very acceptably. There were no failures on the program, which was a good thing from first to last. The visiting veterans expressed themselves well pleased with their entertainment, whereat Andover is glad and hopes they will come again.
