

### W. C. T. U.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

Mr. James L. Hughes, Inspector of Public Schools, has been at pains to collect the views of some noted theologians of Ontario on woman suffrage. Chancellor Burwash of Victoria University writes that as he reads the Scriptures he finds "their whole tenor places woman on a perfect equality with man." Professor Septimius Jones, of Wycliffe College says: "The right of women, under any system of representative government, to have a voice, if she will, in framing the human laws which men will compel her to obey, is surely self evident. Woman is man's equal, not his servant or his slave. It lies not upon the woman to prove her right to vote, but upon man to show why she should be denied it." Mr. Hughes sums up the points for consideration, as follows: Those who have opposed woman's enfranchisement because they believed it to be out of harmony with the teachings of the Bible, should note the following facts:

1. Many of the best theologians are earnest advocates of woman suffrage.
2. The best authorities in Bible exegesis state that the Bible is not opposed to woman's enfranchisement.
3. The records of both the Old and New Testaments show that women were allowed to fill high positions in the church and in the State.
4. Most Protestant churches now give women the same right as men to vote in church meetings.
5. Man's rule was a part of Eve's curse, therefore the subserviency of woman must be an evil.
6. Man and woman were created equal.
7. Woman as well as man was redeemed by Christ.
8. The conditions of woman's redemption are exactly the same as man's—God is no respecter of sexes.
9. Woman is held responsible by God for the performance of individual duty equally with man. Christ taught the responsibility of the human soul; not of the man's soul merely.
10. Paul's statement—"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, for ye are all one in Christ Jesus," has more than a spiritual meaning. All true progress results from making spiritual truth a more dominant power in human affairs.

#### Have Your Envelopes Printed.

Owing to the great increase in the number of letters received at the dead letter office in Washington, First Assistant Postmaster Gen. Frank Jones has sent out notices to all postmasters, with an order to post it conspicuously. It reads as follows: "Don't mail your letters or packages without having your own address written or printed on the upper left hand corner. This will insure its prompt return to you if not delivered, and will prevent its being sent to the dead letter office."

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The Allegany County Baptist Association will meet at Belmont in June. The Commercial hotel in Wellsville has been sold to Rumsey & Crittenden of Oswayo, Pa.

The Rev. S. A. Whitcomb of Belair, Md., has accepted the rectorship at St. John's parish at Wellsville.

The Steuben county poor house has an inmate named Elijah Johnson who is 114 years old. Allegany county has one 115 years old.

The Methodist ministerial meeting of the Olean district will be held at Belfast, May 7th and 8th. An interesting program has been arranged.

The village of Belfast wants to be incorporated. The matter is being agitated, and in the near future a vote of the citizens will be taken to decide it.

The village of Gasport, N. Y., was visited by a serious fire Friday morning, which wiped out nearly the entire business portion of the village. Gasport has no fire department.

Lewis Walthers, son of Phillip Walthers, of Belvidere, shot himself last Wednesday. He lived but a few hours after committing the deed. He was 21 years old, and it is thought was temporarily insane.

At the Cuba cheese market last week 400 large and 100 small cheeses were offered and sold at 10 1/4 cents to 10 3/4 cents. Mr. C. J. Elmer bought 700 boxes of Cloverfield, Springfield, Rushford and West Branch at 11 cents to 11 1/4 cents.

The Hon. W. P. Letchworth of Glen Iris, Portage, recently presented to Mr. Grunder, keeper of the county house, for the use of the county farm, a fine, full-blooded, registered Durham bull Duke of Roses. Mr. Letchworth paid \$250 for him when a calf.

Twelve new wells are being drilled in the town of Clarksville. The advance in the price of oil is the cause, and it is expected that many new wells will be drilled in the Allegany oil-fields during the coming summer and a larger number of old ones cleaned out and shot.

The management of the Cuba camp offer the following prizes for the best elocutionary effort in a contest to be held in the afternoon of the W. C. T. U. day, Wednesday, August 15. First best speaker, \$10; second best speaker, \$5; third best speaker, \$3; fourth best speaker, \$2.

A few days ago Mrs. Elizabeth Mulford, an inmate of the county house of Allegany county, attempted suicide by drowning in the creek near the buildings, but was rescued by Keeper Grunder and his foreman. She was taken to Willard asylum Monday. Mrs. Mulford is 70 years old, and was removed to the county house from Hume, about two months ago.

The Chautauqua house at Mayville caught fire at 1 o'clock Thursday morning and was burned to the ground with all its content. The offices of the Raub locomotive works were in the house and several hundred dollars worth of tools, etc., were among the losses. The hotel was among the oldest on Chautauqua lake, and the house and its furnishings were probably worth \$20,000; no insurance. The house was not occupied except as above stated.
