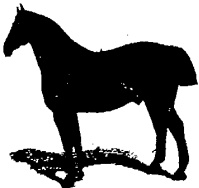

THREE SCORE AND TEN.

A List of Male Residents of Andover Who Have Passed the Allotted Scriptured Age.

"How many men do you suppose there are in Andover who are seventy or more years old?" was the inquiry addressed not long since by Mr. M. H. Harman to a number of different people. One man guessed fifteen, another placed it at twenty-five, and others placed it at various numbers between those limits; but no one who made an estimate thought there were more than twenty-five who had passed the seventieth milestone.

The discussion of this matter arose after the death of Hiram Davis and Almeron Outley, who recently died within two days of each other, and who were both over 70 years old.

Mr. Harman at once went to work to ascertain what the number really was, and also to learn the ages of those whose names he secured. He made a list, which at first contained fifteen or twenty names (those who could be called to mind on short notice.) Each day the list grew, and grew—until Mr. Harman's little book contained the names of fifty-five persons, with the age of each.

We print the list below. It is not guaranteed to be absolutely complete and accurate, but is believed to be as nearly so as it is possible to make it.

The compiling of the list required considerable time and careful inquiry on the part of Mr. Harman, and we believe he was assisted to some extent by others who took an interest in the matter.

Died.

Harriet Ann, wife of Mr. David Slocum, died of dropsy at her home in this town on Tuesday, May 1, 1894, aged 64 years. The deceased had been ill for about a year and a half, and was a great sufferer. The funeral was held at the house Thursday afternoon, Rev. J. M. Leach of this place and Rev. Jared Kenyon of Independence officiating.

Memorial Services.

The usual memorial services will be held this year, the Sunday evening previous to Memorial Day. It has been customary for these services to be held in a different church each year, and following this custom, the services this year will be held in the Baptist church Sunday evening, May 7, with sermon by Rev. Wayne Brewster. It is hoped the citizens of this place will unite in attending this service, which cannot be otherwise than a profitable one to all.

Arrangements are being perfected for the observance of Memorial Day, May 30th, and we hope to give the main features of the program in a later issue.

County Sunday School Convention.

The Allegany County Sunday School Association will hold its annual convention in this place, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 22d and 23d. Sessions will be held in the M. E. church Tuesday afternoon and evening, and Wednesday morning. The full program has not yet been arranged, but it is expected Rev. Dr. Deems of Hornellsville will deliver an address Tuesday evening.

A large number of delegates will probably be present, and it is hoped they will be entertained free of charge by the people of this place. A committee has been appointed from the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist Sunday Schools to canvass the village and secure places of entertainment. It is hoped our people will respond promptly to the call, and do all else in their power to make the convention a success, and we believe they will.

New State Bank in Andover.

Mr. J. M. Brundage, of Russell, Kas., has for some little time past been canvassing the matter of opening a new bank in this place. His efforts have resulted in the formation of a stock company, composed mostly of Andover citizens, and the new bank is now practically an assured institution. It will be a State Bank, with a capital of \$25,000, all of which has been subscribed. The list of stock holders contains some of Andover's most substantial citizens. The date for beginning business, and the location of the new enterprise, are matters yet to be decided upon, but it is proposed to get matters into shape for opening as soon as possible and there is a possibility that a new building may be erected in the near future. It is the aim of the projectors of the movement to establish a banking institution which will command the confidence of the people in this section, and which will provide itself with every facility for the transaction of business in this line.
