Peary before he started on his present journey toward the North Pole, and the funds necessary for chartering the vessel were, in the main, supplied by him. The arranging of the details of the enterprise was intrusted to Prof. Angelo Heilprin, President of the Geographical Club, who has already made two voyages to the Arctic Regions in connection with Peary's previous explorations.
