Mr. Thomas Dunigan and family, of Scio, have been visiting friends in this place.

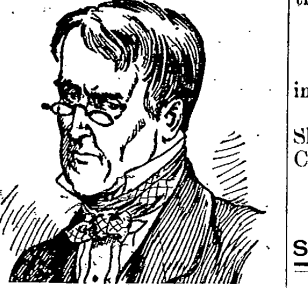
