**NEW COMPULSORY EDUCATION LAW.**

The compulsory education bill signed by Governor Flower last week amends the old law by placing the responsibility for truancy on special officers and fixing penalties for employers giving work to children under sixteen years of age who are not receiving school instruction. The new law provides that every child between eight and sixteen years of age in proper physical and mental conditions shall regularly attend school or receive equivalent instruction by a competent teacher elsewhere than at school as follows: Every child between fourteen and sixteen years not engaged in employment and every such child between eight and twelve years of age shall attend upon instruction as many days between the first day of October and the following June as the public school of the district or city shall be in session during the same period. Every child between twelve and fourteen years of age shall attend upon instruction during such period at least eighty secular days of actual attendance. Parents are liable to a fine of \$5 for each offense in failing to comply with the law and employers interfering with it are liable to a fine of \$50 for each offense. Trustees of schools may appoint attendance officers to enforce the law and may establish a truant school or room in a school for habitual truants. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is to appoint a deputy to see to the general enforcement of the law. Children may be arrested without a warrant and if they are habitual truants they may be taken before a magistrate and sentenced to a truant school or to an orphan asylum or other places of restraint. Districts omitting to enforce the law may be deprived of one-half of their apportioned school money. This bill was drawn up at a meeting of the school superintendents of the state and had not only their support but that also of the various boards of education, school trustees and school commissioners of the state. In addition the measure was sustained by Superintendent Crocker of the Department of Public Instruction, and by the factory inspector and committees of organizations representing the labor union of the State. In former years the act has been opposed. The reason of this opposition was a fear that the proposed law might interfere with the education of Roman Catholic children in Roman Catholic parochial schools. All this opposition disappeared this year after a few amendments had been made to the act clearly giving the Roman Catholic parochial schools a control of truant Roman children. The bill therefore passed the Legislature by an almost unanimous vote, both in the Senate and the Assembly. Nor did the Roman Catholics offer any opposition to the bill before Governor Flower.

Governor Flower has signed the bill abolishing three days of grace on notes and other commercial papers. The law takes effect January 1, 1895.

There is an old law which prohibits a circus from remaining in the District of Columbia more than two days, and Congress proposes to repeal the law. Congress found that the law had been violated times without number—by Congress.

Charles Daniels is being boomed in some quarters for the Republican nomination for Governor this year. He represents a securely Republican Congressional district in Erie county, and was for twenty-eight years a Judge of the Supreme Court, making a phenomenally good run in 1886 for Judge of the Court of Appeals, being defeated by Rufus W. Peckham by a very small margin.
