A meeting of the Allegany County Publication Commission, held at Holliver, April 29, 1892, adopted the following rules, which were unanimously adopted to take effect from the week beginning May 9, 1892.

1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be paid for resolutions of respect, and local notices, and not less than 10 cents for resolutions from which revenue is to be derived.

2.—That notices to be charged \$1.00 per line, and notices of a general nature, such as are not of a character of news, and that of a character to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
