Meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Solivar, April 23, 1892. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted to take effect from the week beginning May 9, 1892:
1. That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for notices, and local notices not less than 2 cents per line be charged for advertisements from which revenue is to be derived.
2. That notices to be charged \$1.
3. That notices, except such as are of a matter of news, and lists of wedding notices, to be charged for as not less than 2 cents.
