A dispatch from Olean to the Buffalo Express says: "There has been considerable excitement throughout Chautauqua County because of the report that E. B. Vreeland of Salamanca intended to be a candidate for the Congress nomination. Chautauqua politicians were wrought up over the report, because many of them want to see Representative Hooker of Fredonia nominated for a third term. Since then a conference was held in Olean, about which nothing official has been given out. Mr. Hooker was present. The understanding here is that this meeting was called in the interests of Mr. Vreeland, and that some of the friends of Mr. Hooker heard of it. They notified the Representative, and he came on to be present at the meeting. As the persons interested are not saying much about the conference, it is not known to the public whether Mr. Hooker was an invited guest or not. However, it is now stated that the conference resulted in putting a quietus on the aspirations of Mr. Vreeland, for the present at least. The inspired Chautauqua county papers have declared that Mr. Hooker will get the Cattaraugus votes in the convention. This seems to be undoubtedly true at the present time. If Cattaraugus County should go for Hooker in the Congress convention, and Chautauqua should vote for Higgins in the Senate convention, then honors would be even. The fact remains, after all, that the candidacy of Mr. Vreeland was once announced, even if it is now a thing of the past."
