A meeting of the Allegany County Association, held at Holtz, April 29, 1892, adopted the following rules, which were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:
1. That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
2. That 5 cents of blanks to be charged \$1.
3. That 1 cent be charged for each line of obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 1 cent per line.
