A meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Holtzlar, April 22, 1892. The following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be allowed for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for a; not less than 5 cents per line.
