Death of Anson H. Brewster.

Anson H. Brewster died Saturday morning, June 16th, 1894, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Mary Cole, near Andover. He had reached the advanced age of 81 years and 9 months. He was born Sept. 9th, 1812, in Albany Co., N. Y. With but a brief interval he had resided in this vicinity over fifty years. He was a probationer of the M. E. church, confessing faith in Christ as his Savior. The general testimony concerning him is that he was of a good, gentle, genial disposition; of an even, calm, unruffled spirit. His children sweetly cherish his memory as of a most kind and loving father. Even at fourscore years, he was of exceptionally excellent form and feature to look upon. His last illness was protracted and he finally experienced severe suffering. Funeral services were at the house, June 18th, ably conducted by Rev. J. M. Leach, pastor of the M. E. church of Andover. There were in attendance one brother, one son and three daughters, seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren, other relatives and a large company of friends and neighbors. On the way to the place of burial the procession was overtaken by a heavy rain storm, accompanied by thunder and lightning. Even such is appropriate, that nature weep with unfeigned sorrow and quake with grief when the children of men descend into the realms of death and the grave. But as the storm and clouds passed and the sun shone again, so the Sun of Righteousness cheers us and turns our present sorrow into joy through the assurance that though a man die, yet shall he live again. He who liveth and believeth on Him who is the resurrection and the life shall never die, but shall live forever. In death he liveth and cannot die.

Sunday evening, June 17th, '94, the Y. P. S. C. E. of the Baptist church appointed three delegates, viz., Mrs. A. M. Burrows, and Misses Meade and Pauline Barney to the Young People's Society Session of the Allegany Baptist Association to be held at Belmont, Wednesday evening, June 27th, 1894.

Great preparations are being made for the International Convention to be held at Cleveland, Ohio, July 11-15. In general, the railroads throughout the country will grant a rate of one fare for the round trip. Tickets will be good until July 31 and may be extended by applying to the proper authorities, until Sep 15.

Last week Judge Rumsey of Bath refused to grant a permanent injunction restraining the building of the jail at Belmont, and the work is now under way and will be pushed to completion unless a higher court grant a further injunction, which at present does not appear likely.

Mr. William C. Cannon of this place was graduated from Alfred University yesterday, with high honors. Mr. Cannon was the Salutatorian of his class, and was the recipient of numerous congratulations upon his achievements at the noted institution of learning from which he graduates. A large number of his friends from this place were present yesterday at the exercises.

A decision in the case of Burdette B. Brown and Mabel Brown against Chas. Dow and others was handed down by the General Term of the Supreme Court at Buffalo yesterday. The case was won by the plaintiffs on the trial before a referee, and the defendant, Dow, appealed to the General Term. By the decision rendered yesterday, the judgment of the referee is affirmed. Judge Henderson of Randolph made an argument in favor of the appellant, Dow, and L. C. Van Fleet argued the case for the respondents, before the General Term.

The commencement exercises of the school were held last evening in the opera house, and the building was packed to its fullest capacity. Notwithstanding the fact that the room was intensely warm, those present enjoyed the affair immensely, and great credit is due to the performers, one and all, as well as to the teachers who arranged the program and drilled the scholars.
