The afflicted husband, mother, brothers, sisters and other relatives have the sympathy of the people in this community.

The remains were taken to Alfred Centre Monday evening, and the funeral was held this morning, the burial also being at that place.

Mrs. Edwin Wheeler, who lives between Green's Corners and Whitesville, was taken to Willard asylum yesterday. She has not been in her right mind for some time, and has lately been growing worse, and it was thought best to take her away for treatment.

Notice to Water Users.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Board of Water Commissioners, at a meeting held Tuesday evening, June 26, 1894:

Resolved, That from and after this date, no person shall attach a hose to a kitchen, store or other faucet, for sprinkling purposes, without having made application therefor at the office of the Village Clerk, and paying the regular rate for sprinkling, which is \$3.00 for the season.

Resolved, That from and after this date no person who has water connection in house, store, office, lawn, yard, stable or elsewhere, shall allow any person not a member of his family to take water from such connection under any circumstances whatever, in pails, buckets, or other receptacles.

These resolutions are intended to prohibit parties from using water without paying rentals therefore, and will be rigidly enforced.

A Postmaster Arrested.

George Armstrong, a pensioner of the United States, died at his home in the town of Red House on the Cattaraugus Indian Reservation on January 10th.

The day after his death a letter arrived to his address containing a check for the amount of the pension due him up to the 1st of January. John McCabe is the postmaster of Red House, and also the owner of a general store. He claimed that Armstrong owed him some money at the time of his death, and finally after repeated efforts, it is said, succeeded in getting Jesse Armstrong, a son of the deceased, to open the letter and endorse the check with the dead man's name. The check in the course of time came to the Assistant United States Treasurer and was paid.

The agents of the Government learned that Armstrong was dead when the check was signed, and not believing in spiritism to that extent, began an investigation, with the result that McCabe was arrested, charged with forgery, or the securing of a forgery, of the dead man's name to the check.

Not only this, but he was also arrested on another equally serious charge, that of perjury in falsely swearing in connection with the special investigation that was conducted by the officers of the Government regarding the check.

The cases were examined into by United States Commissioner Hazeltine at Jamestown on Thursday, and the defendant was held for further examination on July 17th.

A magnificent Soldiers and Sailors Monument to those veterans who have died at Bath, will be unveiled June 18th, on the grounds of the Soldiers' Home in that village. Samuel Dites left the money with which to erect the shaft.

The graded school house in Knoxville, Pa., was struck and badly injured by lightning Monday afternoon. A select school which had been in session during the day had just adjourned, thus averting loss of life, although the shock was felt by several persons in town. The loss is partly covered by insurance.
