Postmaster General Bissell thinks that Government control of the telegraph would add enormously to the annual deficit of the country's finances.

Now that the tariff debate in the Senate is about ended, who is the Senator who will stand proudly forth and exclaim in tones that will echo around the earth: "I talked the most!"

Attorney General Olney has asked for an additional appropriation of \$50,000 for United States marshals, etc. The Coxey army disturbances have cost the department of justice more than \$52,000.

A Washington dispatch says a friend of Senator Hill states that the Senator will not be a candidate for Governor next fall. Senator Hill is in favor of the renomination of Governor Flower, provided that official desires a second term.

Prendergast, the assassin of Mayor Carter H. Harrison, was declared "not insane," by a jury in Chicago, Tuesday afternoon, and under sentence of the court must be hanged on Friday, July 13th. The Jury was out just two hours and five minutes.

In Buffalo, last Saturday night, two men got into a quarrel while discussing the question whether the sun "draws water" to make rain. In the fight that ensued one of the men was killed. The great problem which the men were discussing still remains unsolved.

The Constitutional Convention last week voiced the sentiment of the people when it expressed its horror at the assassination of President Carnot and its sympathy with the French republic. Anarchists are the enemies of all civilized nations, and it is the duty of all to make common cause against them.

A Chicago barber was shaving a man, when another man entered who had recently had a quarrel with the barber. The knight of the razor quit shaving long enough to fire four shots at the man, killing him instantly, and then resumed his shaving. There is no doubt that the barber had nerve, but what do you think of the man who was being shaved?

The last previous Constitutional Convention ignored party lines in the discussion of amendments to the Constitution, and these matters, therefore, did not enter largely into the political campaign of the election succeeding. But this year the members of the Republican majority expect to act solidly, under caucus rule, in disposing of the chief questions which come up, and the record so made will commit the party in the State to the support of the position taken by its representatives in convention. The Democratic delegates, from present appearance, will vote as individuals, and not solidly, on important questions.
