At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1894, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 3, 1894.

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for as not less than 5 cents per line.

Mr. E. H. Lake of Wellsville has placed a very handsome family monument of Barry granite in the Lever cemetery for Mr. G. M. Barney.

The Republican Congressional Convention for the 34th District, comprising Allegany, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties, will be held at Wellsville August 1st.

Present indications are that the apple crop will be a small one in this vicinity. The trees hung full of fruit a short time ago, but it is all dropping to the ground.

A spark from a passing train set fire to the house of Mr. P. Mulcahy at Tip Top, on Monday afternoon, but the fire was extinguished before serious damage was done.

Of course Mr. A. C. Frisbey is all right on the tomato question; but he isn't the only early bird, for Mrs. G. M. Barney picked a mess of ripe tomatoes from vines in her husband's garden last month.

Hereafter there will be no such post-office as Alfred Centre in this county. The name has been changed to Alfred by the postoffice authorities, and the village officials will doubtless soon follow suit.

The weed called "paint brush" has appeared in many towns in this and adjoining country. It is an old timer in this vicinity and has bothered the farmers in Andover and Independence for a number of years.

Mr. H. A. Benedict, who recently took an examination in Rochester for the purpose of receiving a pharmacist's license, has received notice that the examination was satisfactory, and the license has been granted.
