Cards of thanks to be charged \$1. Extra-ordinary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 10c per line.

Arthur M. Gayhart died in Hartsville, on Saturday, July 7th. His age was 22 years. The funeral was held at Mrs. Teller's in that place Tuesday afternoon, the burial having taken place soon after death. Mr. Gayhart was a young man of excellent qualities, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him.

The residents of Green's Corners will soon burn gas for fuel and lights. The Woods Oil and Gas Company, composed of Messrs. A. A. Woods and C. Lester of Richburg, and Dr. N. P.
