At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

1. That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

2. Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

3. Ordinary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

Death of Dr. H. L. Ensworth.
From the Olean Times of Saturday last we copy the following account of the death of Dr. Henry L. Ensworth, whose death was mentioned in the News last week. Dr. Ensworth at one time lived in Andover:

"Dr. Henry L. Ensworth died at his home in West Salamanca last Sunday night at the age of 72 years. The Dr. had a stroke of paralysis several years ago and for the past two years was almost entirely helpless. He had lived at West Salamanca for over 30 years, and until his illness had a large practice. His wife and daughter Fannie gave him devoted care during his long illness. Another daughter, Mrs. Julian Strawn, and son, George, resided in Kansas and could not get home for their father's funeral. The services were conducted at the home by Rev. H. S. Bates, Wednesday morning, and the remains were taken to Andover on train 14 for burial."
