I have seen the one curse in the labor cause—rum. It is the one reason why the laboring man does not advance himself. My voice has always been raised to warn him to shun drink as he would the flames of scorching hell. Show me misfortune, and I can point to some saloon. Show me misery; it is strong drink. The community where the most misery prevails is the community where the most liquor is sold. If free from this curse, our workmen could hew for themselves a name and a place no man of them ever dreamed of.

The path of the honest, industrious workman and that of the rum-seller lie in different directions. No question of interest to labor has ever been settled satisfactorily over the bar of a rum-hole. No labor society ever admitted a rum-seller that did not die a drunkard's death.

The late Secretary Windom is quoted as saying, in his address in New York, on the anti-saloon movement, that in his opinion "the two hundred thousand saloons of the United States have been instrumental in destroying more human life in the last five years than hundreds of thousands of armed men did during the four years of our civil war." More than twenty five thousand new persons, chiefly young men, are drawn into the business, as bartenders and other employees every year, and each one becomes an agent of the brewers and saloon owners in their own work of death. And the death rate among bartenders and hotel employees is greater than among persons in any other business, more than twice as large as the death rate among ministers of the gospel. God's curse is on the man who puts the bottle to his neighbor's lips. Let the friends of youth, the lovers of home and kindred, and the guardians of public morals and of a better citizenship, read and ponder.

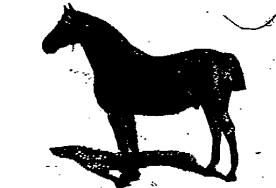
