At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Villages of Andover, N. Y., held at the office of the Village Clerk on the 2d day of August, 1894, it was moved and carried that Article 7, Section 1 of the Village by-laws be amended so as to read as follows: Peddling, Selling goods at Auction, etc.—No person shall ring bells, blow horns or cry goods, wares or other commodities; or hawk or peddle the same in any of the streets of this village; or sell any goods, wares or merchandise within the limits of this corporation at auction, until a license shall have been granted therefor as hereinafter provided, under a penalty of ten dollars and costs for each and every offense.

Any person desiring a license for any of the purposes mentioned in this section shall file with the Clerk of the Board of Trustees a written application therefor, stating the kind of goods, wares, commodities or merchandise he desires to hawk, peddle or sell at auction within the corporate limits of this village, and whether he desires to sell from a vehicle or upon foot, and shall pay the license fee which shall be prescribed by the said Board of Trustees, which shall be the same to all persons desiring to hawk, peddle or sell at auction the same kind of goods, wares, commodities and merchandise under the same circumstances.

Upon the filing of such application and the payment of said license fee, he shall receive from the Board of Trustees a license signed by the President and Clerk of said Board, unless some reasonable objection shall be found to exist to granting said license. This section shall take effect Aug. 15, 1894.

Farmers' Re-union at Silver Lake. Thursday, August 9th, will be Farmers' Day at Silver Lake Assembly. This will be the greatest day of the year. Senator Wm. Peffer of Kansas and Col. S. F. Norton of Chicago will address the assemblage. Every "tiller of the soil" should make this a holiday for himself and family. Special train on the Erie will leave Andover at 8:20 Fare round trip \$1.25.

Thursday has been designated as "Governor's Day," when Governor Flower and staff will be present. He will be accompanied by Hon. Fred C. Schraub commissioner of agriculture, Adj. Gen'l Porter and other eminent gentlemen. The military display on this day will be one of the greatest ever seen in this part of the State. A full battalion of the national guard will be present, consisting of the following separate companies: the 26th and 30th of Elmira, the 43d of Olean and our own 47th.

Friday suitable prizes will be given for the horse races and the club will also give \$100 in gold to a couple who will be married, on horseback, in front of the grand stand. The premium list has been thoroughly revised and in the department for ladies work, the amount of money given for each premium has been doubled.

As usual Saturday will be Members' Day and a program will be arranged that will be greater than ever before. Bicycle races will also be held on that day.

W. C. T. U. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month. Abraham Lincoln said: "The liquor traffic is a cancer in society, eating out the vitals and threatening destruction, and all attempts to regulate it will not only prove abortive, but will aggravate the evil. No, there must be no more attempts to regulate the cancer; it must be eradicated. Not a root must be left behind, for until this is done, all classes must continue in danger of becoming victims of strong drink."

Three significant utterances at the great Christian endeavor convention deserve special notice. The first was by Rev. Smith Baker, of Boston, who said: "What justice is there in forbidding an intelligent, cultured woman, possessed of property, who is conversant with the history of her land, paying taxes to support the schools of her land; what justice is there in allowing a poor, penniless, illiterate foreigner to vote when such a woman is not permitted to do so? I do not propose to discuss this question, but when the woman who is capable of being president of a college, when a woman is capable of presiding over business affairs, shall have justice done her she will have the right to vote. These are truths which any Christian democracy and which Christian citizenship must claim for everybody." Our great hearted brother, John G. Woolley, said in his marvelous address: I will hold no politician's coat while he stonies a prophet or denies full citizenship to a woman. By the grace of God I will be a Christian Christian and a manly man. I will confess Christ before people and on election day, which in this land of equal rights is man's day. I will show myself a Christian voter, fit to represent unfranchised womanhood at the polls. I will go to Him, hear His words, and whatsoever He says unto me I will do it. Upon that rock I will build my politics and the gate of hell shall not prevail against it." Samuel H. Gompers, today the most trusted labor leader in America, had these words in his address to the country in which the Federation of Labor declines to strike: We reiterate the fundamental trade union principle that working people, regardless of sex, creed, color, nationality, politics or occupation, should have one and the same interest in one common cause for their own political advancement.

Mr. Black "Tumbled." [From the Wellsville Reporter.] Geo. H. Black, a prosperous farmer of Scio, was at work repairing his pig pen Friday afternoon, when two strangers drove in and tried to sell him a patent folding table, but he didn't need one and would not purchase. They admitted a fine litter of pigs he had and one of the party wanted to purchase a pair of them. He bargained for two, agreeing to pay \$8 and would send for them soon and asked Mr. Black for his address; the farmer told him to address him at Scio. But the stranger wasn't sure and preferred the farmer to write his own address and produced a little memorandum book. Mr. Black at last wrote his name and address in the book and the strangers departed.

Friday night was a sleepless one for Mr. Black, he felt disturbed and wished he hadn't written his name in the book. To think was to act, and early Saturday morning he drove to Wellsville determined to correct his work. He was fortunate to meet the gentlemen at Rice's livery stable and invited them into a store nearby, stating he wished to write his address over in ink that there should be no mistake. The two strangers complied with his request and when he once more had his signature he was not slow in spotting its look with a plentiful supply of ink. He then informed them that when they wanted the pigs, to address him at Scio and it would be all right.

Saturday morning a stranger called on a prominent business man in town, spoke about getting some notes discounted and asked as to the responsibility of several farmers in this vicinity and among the names mentioned was that of Geo.
