At a meeting of the Allegany County News Association, held at Bolivar, April 1st, the following rules were unanimously adopted to effect the week beginning May 9, 1894.

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per copy be charged for resolutions of respect, and 10 cents per line for resolutions of condolence, and 15 cents per line for resolutions of appreciation.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged 10 cents per line.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and listing presents to be charged for at not less than 10 cents per line.
