A dispatch from Ceres, in this county to the Buffalo Express, dated August 18th, says:

"Fifteen years ago, Henry Smith, a prosperous hop-grower and contractor, after meeting with financial reverses, suddenly disappeared from his home in Ogden, Monroe county, N. Y. Continued efforts on the part of relatives failed to locate him, and he was given up for dead.

"Yesterday he was found, by his son, living in a hemlock shanty in the forest two miles from Ceres. Smith is now 73 years old. He is a noted hunter and fisherman, and has traveled much. His hair and beard are long and snow white. He is a victim of Bright's disease, contracted from exposure, and has not long to live.

"He has spent the whole fifteen years of his voluntary exile in this vicinity; part of the time he worked as a farm hand. Five years ago he built a shanty in the woods, and has since lived a hermit's life, coming to the village at long intervals. He was too proud to return home. He stubbornly refused to reveal his identity, and only when told by a physician that his case was serious, would he reveal the address of his family. A letter was sent at once, and on Saturday his only son arrived here. The meeting was affecting. This afternoon, after giving away his possessions to those who had befriended him, father and son departed for Ogden, where the aged wanderer will pass the remainder of his days among his children."
