 A meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, adopted the following rules were unanimously adopted to effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:
 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 50 cents per line.

Erie train 26, which now runs as extra train 14, and carries passengers, stops at Andover station at about 1:30 p. m. except Sundays. This train will give Andover people a service long needed, and one which we are sure will be duly appreciated.

The *Ayr Observer*, published at Ayr, Scotland, contains in its issue of Aug. 7th, a mention of the Ayrshire dairy owned by W. G. Tucker of Elm Valley, giving the milk record of each cow for a season. The highest record is that of the cow Princess Aldine, aged 10 years, 14,200 lbs.; the lowest, that of Glasgow Beauty 2d, aged 1 year and 7 months, 5,927½ lbs. The average per head for the season was 8,100 lbs.

Mr. Clark N. Robbins, of South Lancaster, Mass., has bought the house on Church street recently advertised for sale by Mr. A. M. Burrows. Mr. Robbins will move his family to Andover in the Spring if not before. Sunday was a great day at the Cuba Temperance Assembly, and a very large crowd was present. The auditorium was not large enough to accommodate all who wanted to hear the Rev. A. C. Dixon in the afternoon. His subject was "Myths and Moths of Modern Infidelity." He is a very eloquent orator, and his command of language is probably equal to that of any orator ever heard in this county. The editors and their wives were treated to an informal dinner at the Kinney house by Messrs. Glenn of the *Cuba Patriot* and Willard of the *Belmont Post*, who deserve a vote of thanks for their efforts to make the occasion a pleasant one for their guests.

Mrs. Jason A. Hunt has a night blooming cereus which has beaten all previous records, so far as we are able to learn, at least in this vicinity. Last Saturday morning the plant contained nineteen buds, which was not more than one-half of the number the plant had borne this season. Mrs. Hunt having removed at least twenty buds, fearing that the vitality of the plant would not be sufficient to cause the plant to blossom. Saturday night one of the buds opened, Sunday night five more blossoms appeared, and Monday night the very unusual spectacle of ten large, perfect blossoms was witnessed by those who were fortunate enough to call at Mr. Hunt's home. This leaves three more buds which will probably open to-night. They would have done so last night had not Mrs. Hunt kept the plant in a cool place yesterday. The sixteen blossoms which have already appeared were of a nearly uniform size, being about eleven inches in diameter. Mr. and Mrs. Hunt kept "open house" during the time the plant has been blooming, and were pleased to see all who came to view the beautiful and fragrant plant. P. S.—Strange to say, the remaining three buds opened today, attaining their full size about 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Mr. N. M. Lanphear had a cow killed on the farm crossing near his house last evening, and very nearly lost a farm hand.
