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## NEAR-BY NEWS.

**A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.**  
A giant wild man is said to be running at large through the wilds of Potter county, Pa., and the feats he performs are of the hair-raising variety.  
An epidemic of suicide prevails in and around Bradford. Within two weeks five persons have attempted to take their own lives, of which three were successful.  
Two men near Binghamton quarreled over a line fence. One went to the house and got his gun, and shot the other man dead. He gave himself up and is now in jail.  
The Allegany County Firemen's Association meeting to be held at Wellsville on September 26th and 27th is to be made very interesting. There will be a prize drill, a parade, 100-yard foot race, 150-yard foot race, one mile bicycle race, 200-yard hose race, 50-yard sack race, 300 yard hook and ladder race and a bicycle parade.  
After a pastorate of 40 years the Rev. Thomas K. Beecher, brother of the late Henry Ward Beecher, has retired from his duties as pastor of the Park church, in Elmira preaching his farewell sermon last Sunday. Mr. Beecher's new assistants, the Rev. Samuel Eastman and his wife, the Rev. Annie F. Eastman, of Rochester, will succeed to the duties of the pastorate, although Mr. Beecher will remain at the head of the church, which he founded and fostered, as long as he lives.  
At 1:30 o'clock Friday morning the village of Hammondsport was again visited by fire, being the ninth time within a few weeks. Several buildings were burned. The same day three men were arrested for incendiarism and the proof is almost conclusive that they have caused all the trouble. Also, on the same day a vote was taken on the question of constructing water-works, and the proposition was carried by a very large majority. The village will be bonded for \$20,000.  
Tomorrow evening at Hornellsville, Governor Flower, who will be in attendance at the Exposition, will go to the opera house to see the production of "The Rainmakers," by the clever comedians, Donnelly and Girard and a brilliant cast, among whom is numbered the celebrated actress, Isabelle Crughart. This performance is to be the event of the week, and the opera house will be taxed to its utmost capacity to hold the crowd that will be there on this occasion. Governor Flower's staff will accompany him and the entire party will occupy two large boxes which will be appropriately draped for this event.  
At the recent meeting of the Allegany county G. A. R. association at Belfast, a resolution was passed to place before the several Posts of the county at the next regular meeting a proposition to raise funds for the erection of a suitable monument over the grave of Major Peter Keenan of Scio. He belonged to the Eighth Pennsylvania Cavalry and it is a matter of history that his daring saved Chancellorsville to the Union army. To gain a few minutes for the erection of a battery to oppose an onslaught led by Stonewall Jackson, Major Keenan led 400 men forth and with them held 10,000 men in check until he fell. The affair is immortalized by George Parsons Lathrop's poem. The proposition was received with every mark of enthusiasm, and it is believed that it will be pushed to a successful finish.
