Village Ownership is Best.

Taxpayers of the village of Cattaraugus have for some time past been dissatisfied with the service they have been receiving from their local water system. It is owned by a company and residents have been charged high prices. Last week an election was held and it was voted that the village put in a system of its own. The cost is estimated at from \$15,000 to \$20,000. Money will be raised by the issuing of 4 per cent bonds.

The Woman Relief Corps has secured the noted elocutionist, Miss E. C. Smith of Grand Rapids, Mich., for an entertainment to be given in the Presbyterian church in this place, this week Saturday evening, Sept. 8.
