The members of congress have now all been welcomed home, and the indications are that many of them will stay there.

It is stated that Senator Hill has secured the pen with which President Cleveland did not sign the tariff bill, and that he will cherish it as an invaluable souvenir of the tariff fight.

We see that Mr. Wilson, of tariff bill notoriety, has been renominated for congress by his West Virginia constituency. Mr. Wilson is luckier than most other men; he is rewarded for his intentions.

The political canvass being about to begin, it is fortunate for the public that the Democrats have put salt on the free list, as it will be found necessary to take some of the statements of the impassioned orators with a grain of that excellent seasoning.

The latest use to which bicycles have been put to is to furnish means for an elopement. The feat was accomplished recently in a Long Island town, and was a complete success. An angry papa chased the elopers up the hill and down the dale, but he had no bicycle and when he reached the parson's house the deed was done.

By a law passed at the last session of the Legislature there will be hereafter four instead of three inspectors of election, two from each of the two leading parties. Only three were elected at the town meeting last spring, which were held before the law was passed. Accordingly, it is provided that inspectors already elected shall serve until January 1, 1895, and that on or before the second Tuesday in September a fourth inspector for every district shall be appointed and the appointment filed with the town clerk. The appointed inspector must be of the party which at the last town meeting cast next to the highest number of votes, and when possible, shall be one of the persons who at the last town meeting received next to the highest number of votes for election inspector.

The effect of the new tariff law upon the business of the country may now be definitely reckoned by business men. Uncertainty is removed, not for a month, but for a term of years. The new congressmen to be elected in November will not take their seats until December, 1895. Whatever their attitude toward the tariff, they will not pass a new law reversing the effects of the present law; or, if they do, President Cleveland will veto it. The next congress can give the country no new tariff legislation that is not in line with the existing law. Mr. Cleveland controls the situation until March 4, 1897. Supposing his successor to be a high protectionist and to have a high-protection majority behind him in both branches of congress, they cannot change matters until December, 1897, unless a special session be convened in the summer of that year. Not until then can the tariff be substantially changed.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to govern the week beginning May 9, 1892:

ARTICLE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

ARTICLE 2.—That parts of notices to be charged \$1.00 per line, and obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 3 cents per line.
