To get an intelligent idea of the vastness of the drink bill of the United States for 1892, \$1,200,000,000, we must make a few comparisons: The net earnings of all the railroads of the United States amounts to less than one-third of our drink bill. The loss of property by fire in 1891 was only one-ninth of the liquor bill. The entire expenses of the United States government are only about one-half what we pay for intoxicants. The aggregate capital of all our national banks is about \$700,000,000, or but little more than one-half the amount squandered on drink each year.

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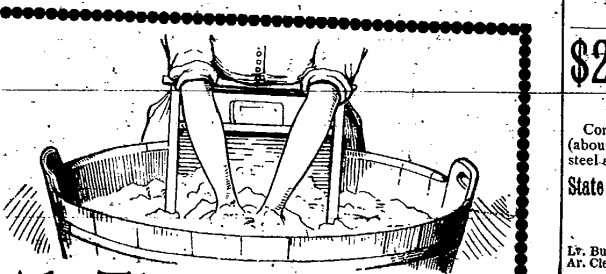
