Pursuant to the above call a large number of business men assembled at the place and time named. The meeting was called to order by Crayton L. Earley. L. C. VanFleet was elected chairman of the meeting, and H. A. Benedict secretary.

An informal discussion was held concerning the matter of organization, and various names for the association were suggested. It was finally decided to perfect an organization to be called the Board of Trade of Andover, N. Y.

It was moved and carried that a committee of three be appointed to draft Constitution and By-laws. H. A. Benedict, H. P. Benton and L. C. VanFleet were named as such committee. They held a consultation and reported a Constitution and By-laws, which were adopted by the meeting.

Next came the election of officers, which was by ballot, and resulted in the election of the following:

After considerable discussion in a general way an adjournment was taken until next Monday evening at L. C. VanFleet's office.

The constitution places the membership fee at \$3.00, which, in the aggregate, will give the Board a good working fund.

The members are all active and progressive citizens, and a spirit of enterprise and determination was manifest throughout the meeting which is in keeping with the spirit of progress which exists among the people of this place generally.

It is earnestly hoped that the next meeting will be largely attended, not only by those who were present Monday evening, but also by those who were not able to be on hand at that time.

NEARLY \$65,000 00. Value of Improvements made in Andover During the Past Year.

We believe that at this time a list of improvements that have been made during the past year in Andover in the way of building, repairs, etc., will be of much interest. The following list is

intended to cover all the new buildings which have either been completed during the past year or are now in process of erection. It may not be complete, but if any new building, or newly repaired structure, has been omitted, the omission is unintentional. The list refers only to new building and repairs on the exterior, and does not include outside painting, or inside improvements in the way of papering, painting, water and gas plumbing, etc., which, if reported, would show expenditure of hundreds of dollars.

A conservative estimate of the value of the improvements mentioned above (in many cases the actual cost being known) places the total outlay for building and repairs at \$44,750. Add to this the expense of the water-works plant (\$20,000) and we have nearly \$65,000 worth of added wealth to this village during the past year—a most excellent showing, indeed.

During the year preceding the present, quite as many new buildings were erected as are named above, and if a complete list of all the new buildings erected in this place within the past four or five years, could be printed, it would be surprisingly large.

To show that the supply of new houses is not greater than the demand, it may be stated that there are no places in this place offered for rent at the present time, and a newcomer is very lucky indeed if he secures accommodations on short notice. We do not recall an instance of any one being obliged to leave town because he could not secure a house, but it is a noticeable fact that no dwelling place stands vacant for any length of time, and a large proportion of the houses that are built for tenants are engaged before they are finished.

In this connection it should also be stated that many new buildings will yet be erected this fall, among which will be a brick building by the Andover State Bank, and several dwellings in different parts of the village.

Andover is enjoying a steady, substantial growth, and there is every indication that the growth will continue. With the splendid system of water-works, the natural gas, excellent school and innumerable other advantages, it is one of the most desirable places for residence that can be found. The greatest need just now is manufacturing interests, and we believe it will not be long before our hopes in this direction shall be at least partially realized. The new Board of Trade will doubtless use every effort to secure something in this line, and it will be strange indeed if those efforts do not bear fruit.

Interesting Census Bulletin.

A census bulletin shows that in New York state of the families living on farms 23 per cent. hire and 77 per cent. own the farms cultivated by them and of these latter 44 per cent. own subject to incumbrance. On the owners farms the liens amount to \$134,960,703, bearing an average interest of 5.66 per cent. and being an average debt per farm of \$1,740 or 43 per cent. of their value. The statistics for homes are as follows: Seventy per cent. hire and 30 per cent. own their homes; 61 per cent. of the latter free of incumbrance. The debt on owned homes aggregates \$245,647,981, bearing an average debt per home of \$1,979, or 42 per cent. of value.

Undeveloped Riches in Potter County.

Since the Goodyear brothers of Buffalo began to develop the unknown wilds of Potter county, Pa., by buying nearly all the vast hemlock forests in the county and building railroads through them, great and surprising discoveries have been made there. On Kettle Creek, near Ole Bull's old wilderness settlement, rich deposits of semi-bituminous coal have been found. Near Hull's, silver ore that assays \$100 to the ton is now being taken out. Iron has been uncovered at Cherry Spring and Galeton, the ore being almost pure. The latest discovery is reported from Sweden Valley, where a strange deposit of ore, specimens of which were sent to Philadelphia, has been pronounced by the experts who examined it as an excellent quality of tin.
