It is announced as a fact that Thomas B. Reed of Maine will be a candidate for President on the Republican ticket in 1896.

Maj. McKinley respectfully begs leave to call attention to the fact that Maine went Republican by a prodigious majority immediately after he had made a few speeches in that State.

The Cuba Patriot says the new order of things will be a shame and disgrace, and an injustice that the people of Allegany will not tolerate, or words to that effect. The Wellsville Reporter says the change will be a very popular one with the people of this county, and hopes that after it is made no future change will be made for years to come. The Republican editors of this county should "get together."

W. C. P. Breckinridge has been defeated in his contest for renomination for Member of Congress in the Ashland district in Kentucky. The contest has been a bitter one, and women of the district took a hand in against the hypocrite, and although they could not vote their influence has been a strong factor in Breckinridge's defeat. Perhaps Col. Phil Thompson, who was attorney for Breckinridge in his slander suit with Madeline Pollard, has changed his mind about "all men being of the same grade of morals as his client." But everybody knows that when Col. Thompson uttered those words he did it for effect on the jury and knew he was speaking falsely. If he didn't know it then he does now, and the defeated Breckinridge has been forced into obscurity, where it is hoped he will remain.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Hollvar, April 29, 1894, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 2, 1894:  
Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.  
Rule 2.—Orders of thanks to be charged \$1.  
Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
