The directors of the Cornell University offer free education to all who desire to pursue agricultural studies. Persons of not less than sixteen years of age and of good moral character may be admitted. The course includes agriculture, chemistry, etymology, botany,

horticulture, dairy, husbandry, animal industry, poultry keeping and veterinary.

The Constitutional Convention has finished its work and has adjourned. The amendments adopted by this body will be submitted to the people at the election next month. The amendments will be submitted in three sections, as follows: Upon one ballot will be the Senate and Assembly apportionment article; upon another ballot will be the canal improvement article; and upon another ballot will be all other amendments adopted by the convention.

The Republican delegates have issued an address to the people explanatory of the amendments, and giving reasons why they should be adopted, and the Democratic delegates have issued an address condemning certain of the proposed amendments. It is to be regretted that party lines have been so strictly drawn in making the fundamental law.
