At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to be in force the week beginning May 9, 1892:
1. That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of certain kinds from which revenue is to be derived.
2. That cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
3. That ordinary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding announcements to be charged for at not less than 1 cent per line.

One volume at a time may be drawn by each reader and kept two weeks. A fine of one cent a day shall be paid for each book kept over time. A reader wishing a book not at the time on the shelves may have it reserved for him at least 48 hours after its return by giving notice to the principal. A printed list of the books may be secured by application to the principal. Books may be drawn at four o'clock on any school day.
