Mr. Gerry said that whipping had been found to be the only adequate remedy for garroting in England. It had saved the life of the queen. In this country, Delaware, which still kept the whipping post in use, crimes and even minor offenses were fewer than in any other state in the union. Mr. Gerry should remember that it is a very easy matter to prove almost anything by statistics.

FIFTEEN BALLOTS.

Each elector desiring to vote at the coming election in this state will be handed by the poll clerks 15 ballots.

Ballots of the first division will contain candidates for these offices: Governor, lieutenant governor, judge of court of appeal, congressman and assemblyman. Of this ballot there will be five, representing Democrats, Republicans, Prohibitionists, Socialists and Populists. Ballots of the second and third divisions will contain pending constitutional amendments voted upon last year and to be

finally acted upon relating to increase of city court judges in Brooklyn and increase of judges in the second judicial department. There will be four of these ballots—two for the amendments and two marked against. Ballots of the fourth division will contain the proposed new senate and assembly apportionment. There will be two of these—one for and one against.

Ballots of the fifth division will contain the proposed new canal article, and there will be two of these—one for and one against.

Ballots of the sixth division will contain the balance of the proposed new constitution, and there will be two of these—one for and one against.
